THE MYSTERIOUS THYMUS

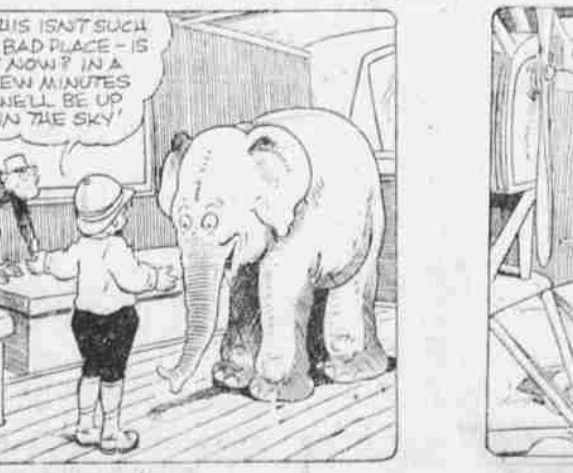
