CROSS-STATE R. R. HEARING BEGINS

H. H. Corey Believes that Crane Line Would Be a Big Aid to Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—New development for Eastern Oregon and the Oregon coast as a result of construction of another cross-state railroad was pictured today by H. H. Corey, chairman of the public service commission, the first witness called in the East-West railroad hearing. Interstate Commerce Commissioner Frank McManamy and Examiner John L. Rogers are conducting the hearing which was called on state public service commissions petition for construction of a line from Crane to connect with Southern Pacific's Eugene-Klamath Falls line.

The country both east and west of the Cascades would be developed by construction of the line, Mr. Corey said. Growers whose products now have to follow a circuitous route to the market might ship direct, cutting down freight costs and getting quicker service.

Western Oregon would share in the development by receiving the shipments from the interior.

In one of their trips to Helen Morgan's club, they were introduced to Miss Morgan, who joined them at their table and ordered drinks. When they complimented her on the quality of the drink, she responded: "It costs us \$6.25 a quart wholesale."

Miss Morgan, according to the affidavits, told them her club did not handle gin "because all the college boys drink gin. We have a lot of them here. They generally have only about \$2.50 to spend in an evening and being their own gin. They could not afford to pay our prices."

Tells of Arrangement.

Miss Morgan is quoted as saying that after the raid on her club last winter she made an arrangement with "Sammy," whereby he doesn't bother her. She evidently referred to Prohibition Administrator Maurice Campbell, the agent added.

Miss Graham who has contended she merely is a business and has nothing to do with the ownership of her club, was represented in one of the affidavits as sharing in the profits.

SMITH BACKS UP BOURBON FARM PLANK

Route to San Francisco, Aug. 2 (AP)—More and better trout and less time between lakes are regarded by Herbert Hoover, presidential nominee, as the "Bourbon" plank in the platform of Northern California where he has spent the last three days fishing.

The nominee expressed himself last night, before boarding his train for San Francisco, where he was due today, and after he had spent a rather unprofitable day casting for mountain trout in Medicine Lake, 47 miles to the east of Shasta Springs, where his party awaited him.

Hoover, his son, Allan, Secretary George A. Brown, and his friend Thomas T. Gregory, of San Francisco, were en route in getting back to the Shasta Springs hotel last night, that those awaiting him there began to grow anxious and started telephoning about the count down to locate the nominees. While the telephone operators were kept busy the Hoover party drove up.

Worried About Rain.

The republican presidential nominee, his face red from contact with the sun on the lake most of the day, was the first to leave the car, but he was surrounded before he could get into the door of his hotel.

"Mr. Secretary, we were all beginning to worry about you," he was told.

Hoover smiled and said there was no need for worry; that the party had stopped at McLeod for dinner and then had motored around the base of Mount Shasta for a time.

"How many fish did you catch?" was the next question asked at the candidate. "We didn't have very much luck," Hoover replied with a smile. "We held a conference and decided that more and better trout and less time between lakes is the burning issue in these counties of Northern California."

Other members of the party disclosed that a single fish was caught during the day and that was hooked by Allan Hoover. The secretary himself had a fish on his line but he dropped it in a two-pound trout which his 21-year-old son had hooked.

LA GRANDE BOYS INSTALLS ENGINE

An interesting clipping from a Corvallis paper has been received here describing the unique installation of an engine in a canoe on Harold B. Schroeder, of near La Grande, and a friend, Mr. Schroeder is attending the summer session. The clipping follows: "Harold B. Schroeder and Ereskine D. Stewart, college men, who are attending summer session, have installed a one-cylinder motor-hike engine in a canoe. They have done this by themselves, making an engine shaft, petrol-driven motor and designed and constructed mountings and control arrangements. The boys purchased the motor for \$5, and the entire expense to them was \$40. This is probably the first inboard engine ever placed in a canoe. It is estimated that the boat will make a speed of 40 miles an hour or more. A paddle is used to guide the canoe which was given its first tryout Sunday, when several successful trips were made on the Willamette river."

VARE GRAVELLY ILL FOLLOWING NIGHT STROKE

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 2 (AP)—Word was received today that William S. Vare, senator-elect, suffered a paralytic stroke last night at his summer home at Atlantic City. He has been deprived of the use of his left arm and leg and for a time was unable to speak.

Dr. Edward R. Kirby of Philadelphia, reached in Vare's bedside and upon his return here reported Vare's condition serious.

He expressed hope that there would be a turn for the better, adding "there is no doubt that Senator Vare is seriously ill."

Vare is 60, the age at which his brothers, State Senator George N. and Edwin H. Vare, succumbed.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 2 (AP)—William S. Vare, 74, elected republican governor of Kentucky in 1899 and sought in connection with the death of his democratic opponent, William A. Connelley, after the Kentucky legislature declared Vare's election fraudulent, died in a hospital here early this morning.

Big Future Seen In Co-Operative Market Movement

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—The day when leadership in agriculture in a national way will devolve upon responsible heads of cooperative marketing organizations, was forecast here by Charles W. Holman, secretary of the American Institute of Co-operations, members of which body completed a four-day tour of Oregon here today.

With every business and national interest strongly represented in national affairs, Holman said, it will be a bright day for rural America when the cooperatives attain such strength as to make them natural leaders and spokesmen for agriculture. With the present rate of growth such time may come within two years, he predicted.

Holman also is secretary of the National Milk Producers' federation of 44 units.

The party was entertained last night at Columbia Gorge hotel, following a highway trip. After viewing plants of the Hood River Apple Growers' association and orchards of the valley this morning the caravan left via the Mount Hood loop for Portland. Some of the visitors will continue on a trip through Washington, visiting cooperative plants.

Soap Co. Damaged By \$100,000 Fire

CHICAGO, Aug. 2 (AP)—A \$100,000 fire swept the rendering plant and soap works of the Hine Brothers Soap company in the stock yards early today.

The large quantity of grease used in soap manufacture was fast fuel for the blaze, endangering surrounding buildings. More than 200 firemen were required to subdue the flames, while squads of police were kept busy holding back a large crowd from the danger zone.

Stockholders estimated the probable extent of the fire, Chief Corrigan said.

Auto-Street Car Collision Kills 1

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 2 (AP)—In a terrific auto-street car crash, Sergeant Clifford of the quarter-master division at Fort Lewis was almost instantly killed and Private Herbert Evans of the same division received a terribly eye and fractured ribs when the car they were driving, hurtled head-on into a street car here last night.

Investigating officers said the car was declared to have been traveling at between 50 and 60 miles an hour when it lunged into the rear of the street car while the motorist was throwing the switch.

had expected to maintain a flying speed of 400 miles an hour which would have brought him at the hour he was forced down to within 400 miles of his goal. The position given in the radio messages however indicated that he was at least 100 miles further from land. It was apparent that the winds had cut down his speed.

A later radio message, relayed by way of Cape Race, Newfoundland, indicated that an American liner, the President Hayes, might be the first of the ships to reach the stricken plane.

SPANISH PLANE FORCED DOWN

LONDON, Aug. 2 (AP)—The Spanish airplane Numancia, piloted by Juan Rivas, of France, was forced down today after having been forced down by engine trouble on the first leg of a trans-Atlantic flight.

Major Franco, with Captain Ruiz de Alca, navigator; Emilio Gallardo, co-pilot; and Pablo Rada, mechanic, hopped off from Caliz at 7:15 a. m. yesterday on a flight which was intended to take them around the world in 45 days in their four-motored seaplane. They headed for the Azores and intended to go from there to New York by way of Halifax.

DAMAGE IS SLIGHT

MADRID, Aug. 2 (AP)—Constructors of the seaplane Numancia said today that damage which occurred in the engine pump forced the plane down when it attempted to fly in the Azores yesterday on the first leg of a world flight. The aviator tried to repair the defect while in the air but finally came down off the Portuguese coast about 120 miles west of Cadiz, their starting point.

The damage was said not to be great and the plane may possibly start again tomorrow from Huelva, where the aircraft now sits.

McLarnin, whose campaign for a return shot at this title, was initiated with a one-round knockout of Phil McGraw, has been established a slight favorite. However, there are plenty of fans who like the chances of the stout-eyed South American who recently defeated Bruce Flowers, the New Rochelle negro.

Respect For Dry Amendment Urged

WILLIAMSTOWN, Mass., Aug. 2 (AP)—Respect for the prohibition laws while they are on the statute books, fair play for the farmers and international cooperation were listed here today by Harry Garfield, president of Williams college and chairman of the institute of politics, as issues upon which the voters of the country were entitled to opinions from candidates for office.

Dr. Garfield was making his convention address at the opening of the eighth annual session of the institute of politics at Williams town.

PLANE PATROL SHUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 2 (AP)—Lieut. A. B. MacKenzie, who has been doing airplane observation work over the fire in the Umatilla national forest, has been dispatched to the Prescott forest, working out of Lakeview. He will check for lightning fires that lookouts have been unable to locate because of smoke sweeping in from California fires.

The lightning storm which crashed Eastern Oregon last week started hundreds of small fires was characterized by old-timers as the most severe in years.

Coolidge Visits Nation's Chief Source of Iron

HIBBING, Minn., Aug. 2 (AP)—The nation's chief source of iron ore supply—the Iron ranges of Northern Minnesota—were on display today for President Coolidge who had selected this occasion to venture from his summer headquarters for the second time since coming to this part of the country for his vacation.

A picture of industrial activity awaited the presidential visit.

Huge boulders sunk into the earth, resembling stacks of granite, with rails, cranes and tiny cars on each of them, steam shovels picking up with apparent ease tons of "red dirt," placing them in cars and going back for more, making still more and deeper tiers; figures of men, appearing on the other side of the bowl like ants crawling in and out of a sand pile—all of this and more could be seen from the observation platform, built especially for the president at the edge of the large open pit, miles away here.

The first on the president's program was the Hill-Rust-Mahoning mine, the largest open pit iron mine in the world and the mine which now is operating where the old village of Hibbing was located. The mine today packed up and moved to make way for its leading industry.

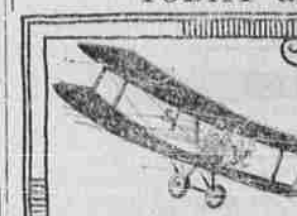
