## HEALTH

**WATER IS SUMMER NEED**  
 By U. S. Public Health Service  
 WASHINGTON (AP)—Water, the "universal solvent" of chemistry, will solve many summer health problems for the individual if properly used.

Plunges of water inside and out, Judie Elzath Service authorities believe, is an excellent hot weather slogan for everybody, from baby to grandpa, from the varanose to the office, factory or outdoor worker.

Under ordinary circumstances for normal persons, six or eight glasses of water a day is "an average natural requirement," but in hot weather three or four more glasses are needed. This additional quantity is required to make up for the larger amount of water which escapes from the body through evaporation and perspiration.

Much has been written and said about "temperatures" or drinking water, but in general, health authorities believe, it is safe to say that cool or cold water is beneficial and refreshing, although taking large quantities of ice-cold water should be avoided, especially if one is quite hot.

Drinks consisting largely of fruit juices, and similar preparations are recognized as being especially refreshing in hot weather, but should not be taken in excess and none of them is more effective than cool water to quench thirst and relieve discomfort from the heat.

Cool or tepid baths have been found to be more comforting, usually than ice-cold baths. For the baby, a cool sponge two or three times a day brings needed relief, and if he has prickly heat.

### Monte Blue Thrills In Aviation Film

Counting swiftly on Col Lindbergh's marvelous flights to the country's neighbors in the Latin Republics, Warner Bros. have released "Across the Atlantic" with Monte Blue as its pivotal character, showing at the Star today.

This picture, dealing as it does with the conquest of the air, seems most timely and opportune. There is a great deal of an interesting nature connected with airplanes and their operation, with which the man with his feet on the ground is unfamiliar.

Without in any way apparently striving to do so, "Across the Atlantic" makes clear a lot of things about heavier than air machines, giving close-ups of the machines on the ground, taking off, soaring and alighting. A tense story of heart-thrilling excitement begins the picture, introducing a young army aviator whose thrilling experiences have brought on an attack of amnesia.

To all appearances this handsome young fellow is all right. Those viewing the story, however, know his real condition. One fears for him. The fear becomes well-nigh agonizing when the young man is ordered to undertake a particularly hazardous flight. The very hazards that surround him, however, snap back that something which made his past life a blank and he follows through in glorious fashion.

What is valuable in this picture is that it incidentally shows some of the early models of the airplane, thus giving an opportunity of pointing out in subtle manner the great improvement that have been made in the machines.

"Across the Atlantic" was meant to be a thriller and it is said that it is all that and more. It gives Monte Blue a role that is going to make him more popular than ever with the routine fans who sigh at his shadow on the screen. John Fennimore wrote the original story of the picture. Harvey Cutler adapted it and the intricate work of direction fell to Howard Fresherton.
