

AL'S FOOT DOWN ON M'NARY PLAN

Equalization Fee Feature Unacceptable to Democratic Candidate

NEW YORK, Aug. 3 (AP)—Gov. Smith put his foot down today on the equalization fee feature of the McNary-Haugen farm bill, declaring that it was unacceptable to him.

The democratic presidential nominee reiterated that he recognized the principle of controlling the sale of agricultural surpluses, but he has no definite plan in mind for carrying out that principle.

Smith was led into a brief discussion of his farm relief views today by newspapermen who sought more light on his statement issued yesterday after his conference with George N. Peck, Illinois farm leader, who has swung to his support.

Answers With Editorial

One of the reporters, who visited the presidential nominee in his 14th floor suite at the Williams, asked whether in stating "control of the sale of the agricultural surplus is recognized by our platform"

an essential need, the cost to be imposed on the one benefited," he had understood the equalization fee proposition which Congress contemplated was unacceptable.

"The lead editorial in this morning's New York World came up on this correctly," Smith responded. A reporter furnished him a copy and the nominee read aloud:

"—That the democratic party is committed to the principle of controlling the sale of agricultural surpluses, cost to be borne by the group benefited.

"—That the plan for applying this principle contained in the McNary-Haugen bill is not acceptable to him.

"—That he has no plan of his own for carrying out that principle.

"—That he promises after election to work out such a plan."
