MENUS

- BREAKFAST**—Apple sauce, cereal cooked with raisins, crisp broiled bacon, cross, omelet, milk, coffee.
 - LUNCHEON**—Shrimp salad in green pepper cases, bran muffins, lettuce with fresh fruits, cookies, milk, tea.
 - DINNER**—Broiled mignon with lemon butter and vegetables, sliced tomatoes, pineapple water ice, cake, milk, coffee.
- An excellent way to use up a few berries, one or two peaches, and a little of some other fruit is in an orange or lemon jelly. Almost any combination of fruits is good, slightly acidified before adding to the gelatine.
- Shrimp Salad in Green Peppers**
- Use one basket shrimp, 2 cup cooked peas, 1/2 cup dried celery, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup chili sauce, 4 sweet green peppers.
- Cut tops from peppers and remove seeds and white pith. Wash thoroughly and drain. Combine shrimp, peas and celery and sprinkle with a little salt and pepper. Mix mayonnaise and chili sauce and pour over shrimp mixture and serve with sections of lemon.

With repairs and alterations completed the new Thrift store has opened formally for business in the building formerly occupied by the Ralph Smith grocery store.

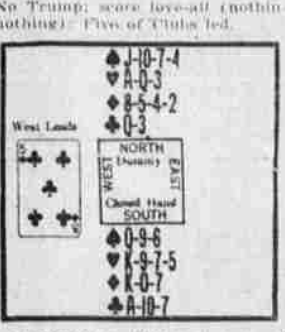

Bridge Pointers

Today, tomorrow and Thursday, the cards of the Closed Hand and Dummy will be given, the contract, and the card led. Today three questions are asked concerning the hand; readers are urged to determine upon their answers before reading the explanations given below.



QUESTION 1: Which Club should Declarer play from Dummy on the first trick?

QUESTION 2: Supposing Declarer play a small Club from Dummy and East play the King, what should "Closed Hand" play?

QUESTION 3: Which suit should Declarer lead when he wins his first trick?

The Answers

1. On Trick 1, Declarer should play small from Dummy. Generally the Queen is the card to play from Queen and one; and this would be true if Closed Hand had Ace and one or two small, or no strength in the suit; but with A-10-x, two tricks will be made by a small play from Dummy, and only one is assured if Dummy plays the Queen. Prove this by putting the King and Jack of Clubs in either adverse hand and note that no matter where they may be, two Club tricks must be made by playing small from Queen's when facing Ace-Ten-x.

2. Closed Hand should play small on the first trick. Two Club tricks can be won—no more. By ducking second and third Club tricks, and possibly block an entry for the West hand to run its long Clubs.

3. Declarer should lead a Spade. Many players would find a heart tempting; but a suit of seven cards (in the two hands) headed by Ace-King-Queen should not be led until a game-saving adverse suit is established. The Ace-King-Queen suit, if good for four tricks immediately, will always be good for four tricks; but if not, to lead it would establish a trick for the adversaries, and it may become good with the aid of adverse diamonds if leading it be postponed.
