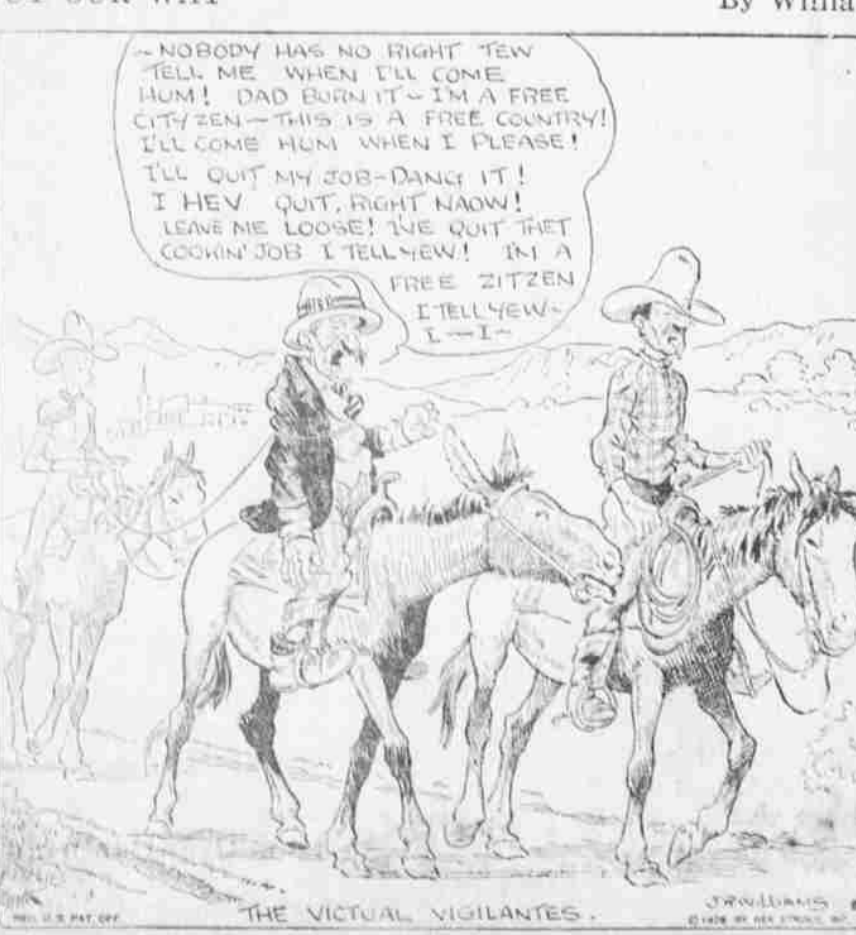

A PRIZE RECIPE

Place the sugar in a sauce pan, add water and allow to heat (not boil) slowly until you are separating the eggs. Beat the whites until they are very stiff, then add the heated sugar which should be very thick. Add to the whites and whip until cold. Add flour and one teaspoon of vanilla, also a few drops of rose extract. Put carefully in a pan and bake in a slow oven one hour and 15 minutes.
