THE HEALTH STATE FOR INFANTS

For 25 years Oregon has been increasing its protection of the health of the people of the state. That Oregon has the lowest infant death rate in the United States is evidence that this work is now bearing fruit. Decreased mortality and infant mortality rates in Oregon are due in a great part to the activities of the Oregon State Board of Health. The board has carried on a state-wide campaign during the past few years. Thousands of mothers have been advised how to protect themselves and their babies against the ravages of disease. School girls have had courses of instruction in motherhood in the Little Mothers Classes. The state board of health in cooperation with the U. S. children's bureau, assisted the University of Oregon medical school, in Portland, to establish a course in prenatal care in which over a thousand mothers have been advised during the expectant period. In this whole group not a single death occurred.

Oregon accepted the provisions of the Maternity and Infancy Act through the Oregon State board of health. The legislature provided funds which made an equal sum available from Federal sources.

During this co-operative period the maternal mortality rate for the state has declined from 22.8 per 10,000 live births in 1922 to 5.9 in 1926. The urban rate decreased from 21.6 to 5.2 and the rural rate from 26.3 to 5.4 during this period. The infant mortality rate for the state as a whole declined from 54.5 in 1921 to 52.5 in 1926, the lowest in the United States.

The influence of good prenatal and confinement care is reflected in the lowered death rates of infants in the first months of life which are largely due to prenatal and natal causes. The rate dropped from 26.9 in 1922 to 21.9 in 1926.

During 1926 a total of 11,565 infants were born in Oregon. The work of the State Board of Health, through the division of child hygiene which administered the maternity and infancy act, reached more than 12,000 mothers and prospective children and nearly 1500 prospective mothers. Every county in the state is receiving aid and advice in maternity and infancy work.

The efficiency of health work is measured by the infant death rate. Oregon therefore stands high in the efficiency of its health department.
