CARDINALS TURN TOWARD BUSHES

St. Louis To Recall Outstanding Players From Minor League Circles

By Herbert W. Backer (Associated Press Sports Writer). Following the example set by the New York Yankees, their prospective rivals, the St. Louis Cardinals, in a slump and well aware of that fact, have sent out an emergency call for assistance.

The Yankees, after a disastrous western trip, recovered their normal winning form almost simultaneously with the arrival of Fred Holtzner, left-handed pitcher from St. Paul. Holtzner won his first start as a Yankee and the rest of the staff took a turn for the better immediately thereafter.

To Recall Players. Now the Cardinals plan to bring new faces into their lineup in an effort to protect the slim two and a half game lead they hold over the New York Giants in the national league.

Club officials, including president Sam Breadon and manager Bill McKechnie, announced yesterday that outstanding players on Cardinal "faux" in the minors would be recalled in an effort to check the Redbirds' slide.

"We are going to do everything in our power to check this slump," said McKechnie, who managed the Pittsburgh Pirates to a national league and world's championship in 1925. "It will be tough to cut players off the list but the big thing is to protect our lead and win the pennant. Sentiment will have no place in our operations."

McKechnie should know all about sentiment or lack of it in the major leagues. After leading the Pirates to the title in 1925, McKechnie was let out the following year when internal dissension wrecked the Pirates' chances of repeating.

The Cardinals announcement that it was going into the byways for new talent overshadowed the routine news of the two big leagues.

Only one game was played in the National circuit, Remy Kremer, the big Frenchman, pitching the Pirates to an easy 6 to 1 decision over the stalling Brooklyn Dodgers.

Kremer, now showing the form that was expected of him, gave the Robins only six hits and never was in trouble. Athletics Win Again. In the American league the idle Yankees saw the Philadelphia Athletics shave another half game off their lead when Lefty Grove, famed only two men where he used to whiff a dozen but the Tigers got two singles and a wild throw by Mickey Vernon in the fourth inning saved the Tigers from a whitewash. The A's victory put them four and a half games back of the Yankees.

In the only other major league conflict of the day Ed Morris registered his 15th triumph of the season when he pitched the Boston Red Sox to a 4 to 2 win over the Cleveland Indians.
