STORE BUILDING COSTS \$25,000

Permit Taken Out For

La Grande's building permits came within \$2,000 of topping the fifth of a million mark last week, with a \$25,000 permit being issued for the construction of the new Montgomery Ward & Co. store building.

The building permit for the Montgomery Ward store was taken out by H. P. Nelson, contractor, for Mary T. Nelson, and called for the erection of a brick and concrete building on Washington avenue between Fourth and Fifth streets.

The building of this structure will mark the completion of a block of business and government buildings that has extended over a long period of years.

This home, exceedingly attractive, would require at least a \$10,000 lot. Planned for an east front lot, with alley entrance to the garage. The projected living room gives an abundance of light and air. The combined living and dining rooms, make a spacious vista through the center of the house, front to rear. Columns with plastered arches and wrought iron rail, separate these two rooms.

From the entrance porch, one enters the vestibule or center hall. Side hall connected the kitchen to the front door. The breakfast alcove placed in front, with view to the street. The large dining room, makes a most ideal room for entertaining. The single car garage is attached to the rear, with the wall, convenient to the rear entrance, with stairs to the basement.

The two bedrooms and bath open off the main center hall and have good wall space with cross ventilation.

There is a full basement with heating plant, laundry, storage and a big dry room or amusement room.

The floors throughout are oak, with oak trim, tile in bath, linoleum in the kitchen. Walls are all rough textured plaster, tinted.

The exterior walls are of frame construction, with white cement plaster and over metal lath, and covered smooth, the red Spanish tile roof and rear trim given a most pleasing color scheme. The yard is paved at \$7,500 to \$10,000, exclusive of heating and plumbing.

CATARACT

Cataract is a disease of the eye which is due to an opacity of the crystalline lens or its capsule. The disease was named cataract from the middle ages when it was supposed to be due to a pouring down of an aqueous liquid in front of the lens. In 1765, Reesman, a French surgeon, demonstrated that cataract was actually due to an opacity of the lens.

The symptoms of cataract depend upon the stage of development, the location of the opacity in the lens, and the extent of the involvement.

There are no inflammatory symptoms and it does not cause pain. Usually, the only symptom noticed by the patient is a very gradual impairment of vision. He is unable to get any improvement in vision by having his glasses changed.

If the opacity is located in the central portion of the lens, it is in the pupillary region, there will be an early and marked loss of visual acuity and the patient will see better in the twilight because the pupil dilates in the dusk and this allows the rays to get through the unaffected or peripheral portion of the lens. On the other hand, if the opacity occupies the periphery of the lens and the central portion, vision is clear, but vision will be better when the pupil is contracted because the opacity will then be covered by the iris.

The patient may complain of spots before the eyes which are caused by multiple opacities in the lens casting shadows upon the retina or he may see double or multiple images which result from optical properties of the lens casting two or more images of the same object as it is focused upon the retina.

In the early stage of cataract, there occurs a swelling of the lens. This may result in the patient obtaining his second sight. He can then throw his reading glasses on which he had been previously dependent, but he needs to wear glasses for distance.

A mature cataract may be recognized by the fact that the lens no longer casts a shadow upon the retina. The lens is no longer swollen and the mother-of-pearl appearance has changed to a dull gray or brownish color. The cataract is now said to be "ripe," because it can be operated upon with the minimum chance of success.

If the cataract is allowed to progress to the next stage, it becomes "overripe." The lens is now so shriveled up that it is very difficult or impossible to remove the cataract successfully.

Cataract occurs about 12 per cent of the blindness in this country. There are various kinds and causes of cataract. Senile cataract is by far the most frequent type. It is much more common than all the other types together. It develops between 40 and 70 years of age. It may affect one eye in the beginning, but eventually involves both. Senile cataract is present at birth. Traumatic cataract results from an injury that is sufficient to cause a rupture of the capsule of the lens. Diabetic cataract occurs in diabetes. Complicated cataract is the result of some other disease of the eye.

Lumber Shipped To Every State From Northwest
