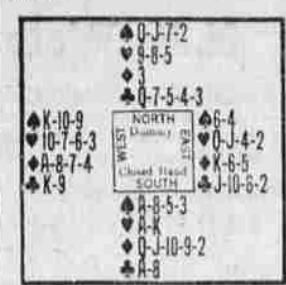

SKIN DISEASE FROM MOLD

WASHINGTON (AP)—A vegetable parasite which is directly related to the mold which forms on stale bread is the cause of one of the most widely prevalent skin diseases in the United States.

Known as "ring worm" of the hands and feet, it is entirely different from the ring worms which attack other parts of the body, and studies made by various authorities indicate that at least half of the adults in the United States are afflicted with it at some time. It is met with in all parts of the country. The Public Health Service has found that it is more frequent in the south than in the drier and colder climates.

Investigation of the parasite indicates that, in addition to thriving on human hands and feet—it rarely affects any other part of the body and never the scalp—it probably can live and grow elsewhere. It is one of the most remarkably resistant organisms known, being able to survive long periods of drying or 15 minutes of boiling before it can be made inactive.

Any one who uses swimming pools or other places where there are common dressing rooms is likely to get the disease, which is most frequently acquired by walking with the bare feet where infected feet have touched the floor or its covering.

Individuals who have the disease, health authorities believe, should exercise great care that the soap, towels, bath mats and floors touched by the infected parts in hotel and club rooms do not fall in the way of others. It is much wiser, they say, for them to spread newspapers where they must walk and burn them afterwards. They also recommend use of light canvas slippers in dressing rooms as a means of reducing the spread of the infection and the frequent cleaning and disinfection of floors in public dressing rooms.

Various methods of treatment are employed by physicians to overcome the disease. Very light doses of X rays have been found to exert a most beneficial influence in a number of cases. It also has been observed that victims who have exposed themselves to the sun and salt water at seashore resorts frequently have frequently been benefited.

LONDON (AP)—The celebration of Scotland Yard 100th birthday has furnished the occasion for an exhaustive analysis of England's victory over crime.

The metropolitan police force was organized a century ago by Sir Robert Peel, whose name is preserved in the popular appellation "bobbies." It has been built up into an institution of such efficiency that England now claims to be the least criminal nation in the world.

How great is the difference in crime between British municipalities and those of other countries may be seen in a comparison between the two largest cities of the world, New York and London. The total of all crimes in New York City with a population of 5,000,000 during one fiscal year was 22,025. The total for London during the same period was 15,622, out of a population of 7,746,000. In other words, London's weight of criminality was practically four percent that of New York.

Closely associated with the Londoner's satisfaction in this low figure is his belief that it is caused by moral rather than armed force. The London policeman does not carry a revolver. His only weapon is a truncheon, or stick, which he uses only when he himself is attacked. The "bobby" is a respected member of the community and usually a magnificent specimen of manhood. He walks unarmed into the most dangerous quarters of the East End of London. He has been known to arrest six men who attempted to attack him merely by wielding his baton assiduously.

The Londoner believes that much of the crime in America is caused by the fact that the police are an armed force. Violence, he thinks, breeds violence.

In England the two undoubtedly major factors which conduce to the reduction of crime by Scotland Yard and other police organizations, and the prompt justice meted out to offenders. In the Metropolitan area of London last year not a single murder was left unsolved. In every case the murderer was uncovered and brought before the bar of a court.

MENUS

By Sister Mary

IRISHMAN—Stewed peaches, oatmeal porridge, grilled tomatoes on toast with cream sauce, milk, coffee.

LA SCHEERON—Bacon and lettuce sandwiches, chocolate milk shake, baked apples.

DIXIE—Vegetable plate dinner, baked new potatoes, spinach timbale, summer squash with cheese, celery, radishes, onions—cassherly ice cream, milk, coffee.

During the hot weather care should be taken that children do not eat their luncheon until rested from play and comfortably cool. Fifteen minutes rest before and after meals may prevent trouble and tummy upset.

Make bacon sandwiches with hot crisp toast.

Raspberry Ice Cream—One pint red raspberries, 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar, 1/2 lemon, 2 cups thin cream, 3 eggs (yolks), few grains salt.

Mash berries and run through a sieve. Scald milk with sugar and salt. Slowly pour over well beaten yolks of eggs, beating constantly. Heat over hot water until mixture coats the spoon. Cool and add berries and juice of 1/2 lemon. Turn into freezer and freeze as usual.

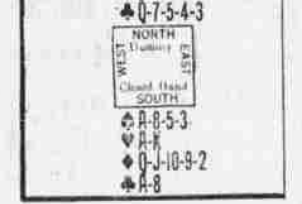

Bridge Pointers

Our Auction Bridge problem for today is Contract No. Trump, Declarer holds the following cards—

With the four of Diamonds led



by West, and the King of Diamonds played by East what card should Declarer play from Closed Hand and why? Make up your mind before you read the explanation that follows.

Play of Declarer

Declarer should play the Nine of Diamonds from Closed Hand on trick 1. West has led the Four, Dummy has the King and Closed Hand the Ace. So Closed Hand knows that the lead was from a four-card suit, it having been West's lowest Diamond. But East (the partner of Declarer) not seeing the Ace, will be unable to tell whether West has opened a five-card or a four-card suit. Should Declarer play the Ace on the first trick, East could count the Closed Hand as having four more Diamonds, and his partner only three more. Therefore he would not return the suit, but would shift to some other—probably Hearts up to Dummy's weakness. Declarer is anxious to have a Diamond returned because part of his scheme of play is to win three Diamond tricks and he wants to establish that suit at once. Therefore, he should play the nine of Diamonds on trick 1 with the hope of inducing East to mark the Ace in his partner's hand, to figure that West has four more Diamonds and South only three, and consequently to continue the suit.
