Bridge Pointers

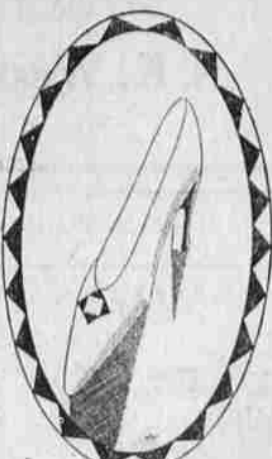

Our Auction bridge problem for today is: With a Heart contract, a Declarer holds the following cards:

♠	J-7-2
♥	8-5
♦	K-8-7-5-4-2
♣	A-K-10-9-8-6
♠	J-10
♥	K-Q-10-9-8-6
♦	A-Q
♣	6

The Queen of Clubs is West's original lead. The Trey of Clubs is played by East. Declarer takes the trick in the Dummy with the King; the question is, what cards should Declarer play to the second trick?

Declarer can be sure that he will not lose a Heart, Club, or Diamond trick. He easily can discard his Queen of Diamonds on a good Club in Dummy after he has exhausted the adverse trumps. A Small Slam is therefore assured; but with a seven-card Club suit in Dummy, a Grande Slam is also assured if tried for. Four Clubs having been played on the first trick and Dummy still having six, the adversaries have a total of three more. Even if the three adverse Clubs are all in one hand, it is perfectly simple to trump two of Dummy's Clubs and make up the remaining four, on which Closed Hand can discard his three Spades and the Queen of Diamonds. There is no difficulty about this because Dummy is in the lead and has entries, viz., the Jack of Hearts and the Seven of Hearts. The adverse Clubs may be divided 3-1 or 2-2 and it would be

HAS YOUR BABY A CERTIFICATE OF CITIZENSHIP?

 Grand new, young citizens of Oregon, that is citizens born in this state, are having a special honor conferred upon them by the state board of health. As soon as the facts of the birth are duly recorded by the division of vital statistics, the division which has charge of the records of births, deaths, marriages and divorces, a finely engraved certificate showing that the child has been legally registered as a citizen is sent to the parent.

This notification of birth registration is signed by Dr. Frederick P. Stricker, the state health officer, acting as special agent of the bureau of census.

These certificates are more than five examples of the printing art. As a matter of fact this certificate is one of the most important possessions a child can have.

A certified copy of the original certificate is accepted as a proof of a person's identity, of his or her birthplace, nationality, age, relationship and for numerous other legal purposes including:

- The right to attend school or to withdraw from school.
- The right of protection afforded by child labor laws.
- The right to vote.
- The right to hold public office.
- Inheritance rights.
- Contract rights.
- The age of consent is marry.
- The age for jury duty.
- The right to secure passports for foreign countries.

The law of Oregon requires the attending physician or midwife to report a baby's birth within ten days to the local registrar, by whom it is forwarded to the division of vital statistics. Parents who are uncertain as to whether or not this has been done, can find out by writing to the state board of health, 303 Medical Arts Bldg., Portland, Ore.

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MENUS

BREAKFAST—Cantaloupe, poached eggs on sliced tomatoes, French toast (thick), milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Stuffed baked cucumbers, cream and cottage cheese salad, peanut jumbles, lemonade.

DINNER—Casseroles of chicken, buttered cauliflower, stuffed green peppers, rice and raspberry bavarian, milk, coffee.

During hot weather a certain amount of care should be observed about what, when and how to eat. The diet should be varied and balanced with the tendency to under-eat rather than over-eat. Never eat when over-tired or very tired, and above all eat regularly. If not hungry at meal time eat sparingly rather than wait and eat "between meals." The stomach should be accustomed to receive food at regular intervals since this encourages proper digestion.

Stuffed Baked Cucumbers.
 Four good-sized cucumbers, 1 lb. eggs, stale bread crumbs, 2 table-spoons butter, 3 dessertspoons minced onion, 1/2 cup finely chopped cold meat, 1 egg, 4 slices bacon, salt and pepper.

Wash cucumbers and cut a slice lengthwise from each cucumber. Remove seeds from main part and save the slice for lid. Cover cucumbers with boiling water and let stand five minutes. Drain, rinse in cold water and dry between towels. Moisten crumbs with hot water, add butter, melted onion, meat and egg slightly beaten. Mix thoroughly and fill cucumbers with mixture. Cover with slice

of bread and bake in oven. You'll know just where you're at.

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
