Now is the time to make sure that poultry and the premises they occupy are free from all sorts of parasites. It is possible to dip poultry in kerosene to kill lice which get much danger from chickens. Chicken houses should be thoroughly disinfected, since many parasites multiply rapidly in hot weather.

It has been found that rape and thousand-headed lice, when fed to cows before milking, have a decidedly harmful effect on the flavor and odor of milk. However, these lice can be given immediately after milking without injuring the flavor of milk drawn at subsequent milkings.

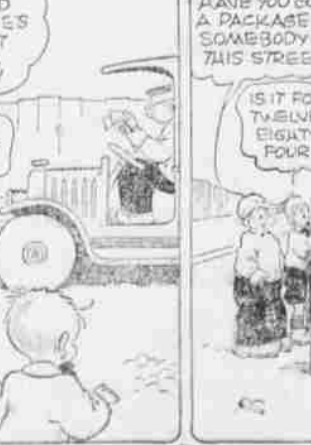

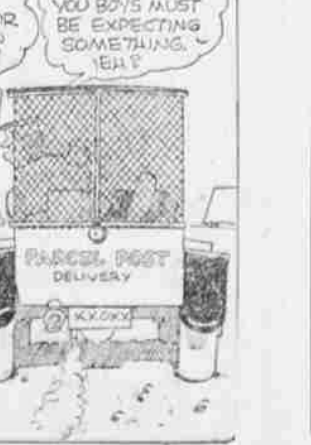
