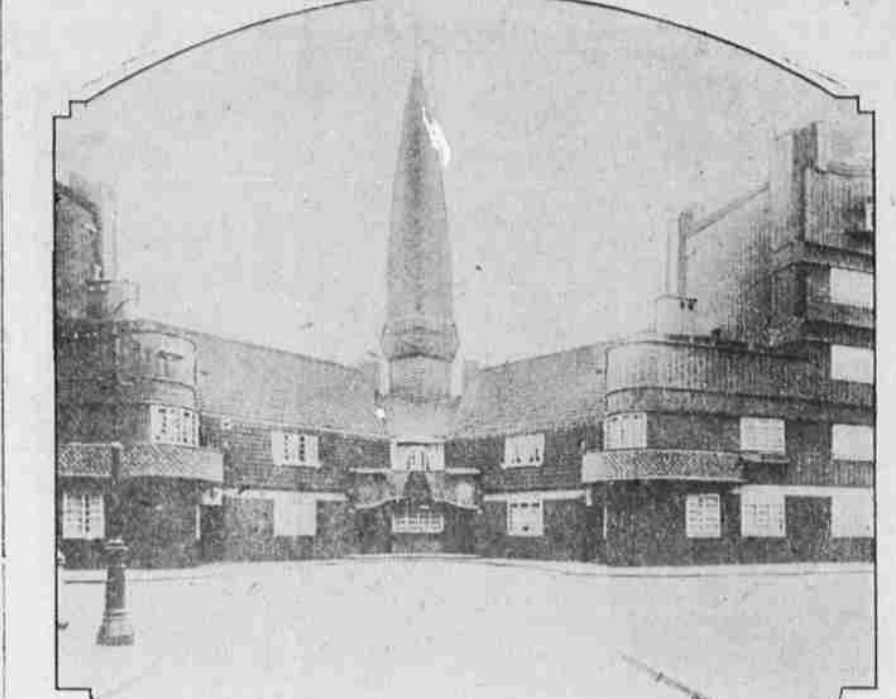

MENUS

By Sister Mary
BREAKFAST— Blackberries, cereal, cream, fried hot beef, eye meat, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON— Fried lamb on toast, corn on the cob, hearts, lettuce, hot cocoa.
DINNER— Vegetable plate dinner, molded egg salad, watermelon sherbet, angel food cake, milk, coffee.
Both hot tea and coffee are at hand when invited but overcracked ice and served at once. Of course, both the beverages must be made double strength, since the melting of the ice dilutes the infusion.
Watermelon Sherbet
Four cups chopped watermelon, 1 cup sugar, white cream, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup lemon rind, 1/2 cup lemon pulp. If a wooden chopping bowl is not at hand, cut in very small pieces with a sharp knife. Use juice and pulp. Turn into freezer and pack in six parts of ice to one part salt. Let stand until frozen to a "dash" stirring frequently to equally distribute liquid and pulp. Stir in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry and let stand two hours longer. Serve in chilled glasses. This is an unusually pretty ice and delightfully refreshing to the taste.
