MENUS

By Sister Mary.
BREAKFAST—Orange, sliced, cereal, cream, baked bacon, popovers, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Stuffed baked potatoes, buttered beets, brown bread, cookies, lemonade.
DINNER—Veal birds, stuffed tomatoes, milked spinach salad, apple pie, milk, coffee.
 Remove seeds from uniform tomatoes and stuff with a mixture of sweet corn cut from the cob, and shredded sweet peppers. Season with salt, pepper and butter.
Stuffed Baked Potatoes
 Four good sized potatoes, 1 cup milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup finely chopped cold boiled ham, 1 small salted egg, 1 slice onion.
 Bake potatoes and cut a thin slice from that side. Scrape out soft part, leaving a shell about 1-4 inch thick. Break up potato left in shell and season with little butter. Fill with ham mixture and cover with a rough layer of potato forced through ricer. Sprinkle with paprika and roast in hot oven. To make croqued ham, scald milk with celery and onion in top of double boiler. Heat over hot water for 15 minutes. Remove celery and onion and stir in flour and butter rubbed together. Cook and stir directly over the fire until mixture boils. Cover and cook over hot water for ten minutes. Add ham and use as required.

Bridge Pointers

During the past month in this series of articles for the inexperienced Auction Bridge player, we have been discussing the difference between business and information. Now we must discuss the difference between a player who should have to double information.

A double for business is sound when the doubler is satisfied that he has the adverse declaration defeated and can make more by doubling than he could by bidding. But the requires for the information double cannot be explained so simply. The player who is contemplating an information double must remember that presumably he is forcing his partner to make a higher bid than the one that the adversaries have named. The adversary who has bid necessarily has strength; he has the doubler; but there usually is some remaining strength divided between the two remaining hands. When all of that strength is in the hand of the partner of the bidder, and none of it is in the hand of the partner of the doubler, the partner of the doubler has to take out with a trickless holding no matter how weak he is; the greater the weakness, the more essential the take-out of partner's information double. Then the result is apt to be disastrous unless the doubler is very strong. I urge my readers not to double information with hands of merely moderate strength. Some players have an idea that they can justify a double, but I like to make my minimum five high cards that are apt to take tricks; and to stick to that minimum even when the doubler is in the most favorable position. I mean when the doubler is sitting over the bidder and the partner of the doubler has not previously passed. That is the case when the doubler is in the Second Hand seat (for example), but it is not the case when the doubler is in the Third Hand seat (for example; South pass, West one No Trump, North double). While an initial pass does not announce a trickless hand, it does announce a hand with insufficient strength to justify an initial bid; and therefore to risk a double, the partner's partner should be stronger than the partner of a player who may have holding strength.

Another doubling position in which greater strength than five high cards is required, is Fourth Hand; for example: South bids, West and North pass, and East doubles. This subject will be continued next Monday.

A child who is afraid of the water must be allowed to make friends with it for himself. Unless he does he will never in his life be really fearless and at ease in the water.

The mother who for the first time takes her little one down to the beach must remember that he has never before seen such wide waters. There are no waves in the bath tub at home and the ocean has no sides to hold on to. The chilly water at his feet is not a bit like the warm, friendly substance in the bath when the celluloid truck goes swimming. Suddenly the "swimming" of which he has been talking so grandly doesn't seem so attractive after all.

If at this moment he is urged or forced into the water against his wish, he will experience a shock that it may take him years to overcome. He must be allowed to take his time. Watching other children who are not afraid, probably will be enough to send him before long splashing in and venturing out with them.

But if he still hesitates, a little shrewdness must be employed to help him overcome his fear. Swimming toys, such as fishes and boats by focusing his attention on the fun of sailing them, will reduce the awe-inspiring power to functioning merely as a part in his play scheme. If he is shown how to throw stones into the water and make a big splash, he will so enjoy his sense of power, and familiarity with the new situation, that he will lose the last vestige of his fears.

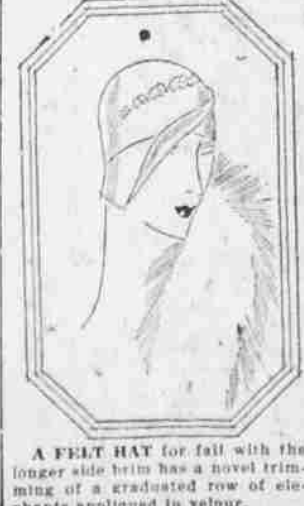
