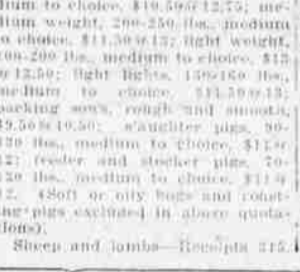

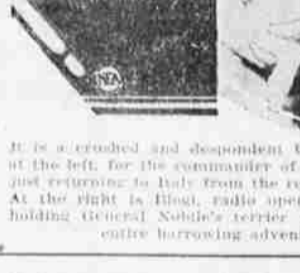

## PRODUCE MARKET QUIET, STEADY

Prunes Offered; Supply of Apples Plentiful But Peaches Are Short

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 20 (AP)—Wholesale produce market was quiet today with prices generally steady at yesterday's closing figures.

There was a case of sweet today which were of normal quality and went to the trade at \$2.50 per box.

A car of Alpacas was received but no price quotation had been given. Alpacas are essentially a winter crop. Shipments are expected to start coming to a week or so.

Fresh prunes of very fine flavor were among early offerings and moved off well at 60c per 15-pound box. Peaches were plentiful at \$1.50 per crate.

Short on Peaches  
Most wholesale houses were rather short on peaches, most of the day's supply being early California from the fields going to the trade at 80c-85c per box. Some small offerings of Yukon peaches were quoted around \$1 per box but retailers were loathe to pay the price and movement was slow.

A few J. H. Hales were still to be had but supplies were light and the price firm around \$1.50 per box.

Tomatoes were in heavy supply and cheap at 80c-85c per 15-pound box for first class stock. Inferior and No. 2 grade stuff sold as low as 50c-60c per box.

Letting was likewise in good supply and prices were steady. Beans and peas were plentiful and went at 50c and 30c, respectively.

Plenty of Apples  
Apples were in large supply and went at a wide range of prices, depending on grade and variety. California Gravenstein topped the market and Gravenstein in general sold all the way from \$1 to \$1.50, depending on quality. Small offerings of Oregon waxes averaged around \$1.15 per box. Utah apples were plentiful at 75c-81.15, depending on size and quality. There were plenty of melons of all varieties and prices were generally easy.

Country dressed meat and poultry markets were in good shape with no accumulation to speak of noticeable in any department. Light hams were easy to 2c lower, but other quotations were steady at Saturday's closing figures.

Butter prices were firm for all grades and standard grades but no changes were quoted from last week's closing figures. Eggs were steady and unchanged.
