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DESOLATION GRIPS HAITI-PENINSULA

Only One of 200 Buildings in One Town Remains Standing—200 Dead

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti, Aug. 21 (AP)—Desolation was widespread today over the southern peninsula of Haiti, where a tropical storm early last week wrecked whole towns, killed 200 persons and left 200 buildings in ruins. Only one of the 200 buildings in the town of St. Louis remains standing. A fishing craft, stranded three days before the water-front, is mute testimony to the force of the tidal wave that accompanied the storm. Eighty per cent of the buildings in Grand Boucan and Petit Trou were demolished. 57. Aerial view of the buildings were wrecked. The hurricane first hurled itself over an area 20 miles wide, from Cayetan to St. Louis and then to Aquin. It spread fanwise northward and northwest across the peninsula covering an area more than 70 miles wide on the north coast from Miragane to Jeremie. The inundation in most of the towns ranged from eight to 20 feet in depth.

War Veterans To File Action For Refund of Money

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 21 (AP)—Legal action in behalf of Oregon World War veterans who have been required to refund allowances paid them for educational aid before being permitted to accept the benefits of the state bonus and loan act which, if successful, will increase the present state deficit by at least \$27,000 will be instituted in the courts here within the coming month, the Capital Journal is advised today. The suit will be instituted by a group of world war veterans who were compelled, under regulations promulgated by the administration of the bonus act, to refund sums received for educational aid before being granted cash bonuses or loans authorized by the people in a constitutional amendment, according to Joe Ninton, local ex-service man who has been engaged as one of a battery of attorneys to handle the case. The contention of the plaintiff-veterans will be that the imposition of the refund qualification for eligibility for a cash bonus or loan by the legislature and the bonus commission is in conflict with the constitutional amendment and that the people in approving the bonus and loan amendment did not contemplate any such restriction of its benefits.
