BREAKFAST—Stuffed peaches, cereal, cream, liver and bacon patties, bran muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Chicken souffle, sliced tomatoes, limberly roly poly, milk tea.
DINNER—Honey dew melon balls, vegetable plate of potatoes, an gratin, stuffed baked tomatoes, buttered onion, spinach, trimmings, frozen custard, milk, coffee.

One cup flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 tablespoons butter, 1/2 cup milk, 2 teaspoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup blueberries, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.

Mix and stir flour, baking powder, salt and 2 teaspoons sugar. Rub in butter and cut in milk. Roll up like a jelly roll, dropping ends

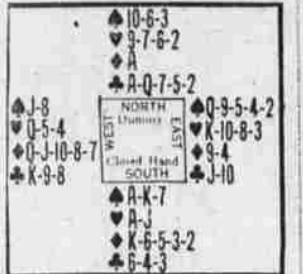

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
We continue today our series of Friday and Saturday Contract and Auction Bridge hands.



Auction Bridge Holding
South one No Trump, followed by three passes.

Contract Bidding
South one No Trump, West pass, North two No Trumps, East pass, South three No Trumps.

South's one No Trump is justified because he has three suits stopped and a count of 15—three over the minimum. North unassistedly has either a jump or a club bid. The jump is justified as a count of 16 is more than sufficient and the strength is also there for the club bid; but the club bid would indicate no assistance for a No Trump outside of the club suit, and the Ace of Diamonds, even if a singleton, is a potent assistance. After North's two No Trumps, South, having bid a 15 No Trump, is justified in jumping to three. The rule is that after one No Trump has been bid and jumped to two by partner, the original No Trump with 12, 13 or 14 should pass; with 15 or higher, should bid three No Trumps.

The Play
West leads the Queen of Diamonds; Dummy wins with the singleton Ace. Declarer, counting his trumps, can be sure of two Diamonds, one Heart and two Spades; in addition to these five tricks, he needs four club tricks to make game and that number can be obtained if West holds the King and one or two small Clubs. One club trick must be lost and the club tricks must be tried, but it can be taken just as well on the second round as on the first.

To trick 2, Dummy should lead a small Club as to start the Club establishment. The plan being that if West holds the King and one or two small Clubs, he will win the lead. Playing the hand in this way, the Declarer will make game.

MAY REDUCE LOANS

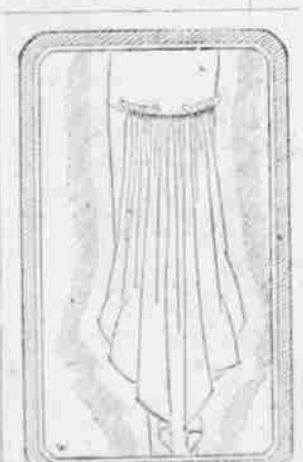
