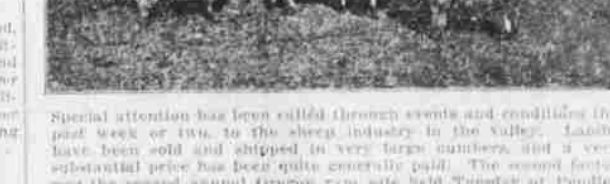
Visits in La Grande—Mrs. M. Rumble, of Joseph, was a visitor in La Grande Wednesday, the guest of friends and doing some shopping here.

Second Annual Ram Sale Draws Local Sheepmen

Union county sheep raisers attending the second annual ram sale managed by the Oregon State Wool Growers' association, at Pendleton on Tuesday, either as sellers or buyers are very enthusiastic over the sale.

In all 13 herds were tested during the month, these including 679 ewes, 57 of which were dry. The total production was 418,452 pounds of milk and 177,727 pounds of butterfat.
