

KNOWN DEAD IN NEW YORK WRECK IS 15

Subway Train Crash Is Second Worst in Goth- am's History

ACCIDENT DURING NIGHT RUSH HOUR

More Than 100 Persons
Injured When Steel Car
Is Split in Two by Im-

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP).—At about 12 noon were killed in a subway wreck at the rush hour last evening. A statement by the police this morning put the dead at 11 and the injured at 161. After the list was issued four of the injured died. The statement was issued after hours of confusion as to the exact casualties.

The ninth car of a ten-car West side subway train bound for Brooklyn split a damaged switch near Times Square station at 5:25 p. m., and ripped through a concrete and stone partition which separates the north and south

bound racks, breaking in two as it struck. The scene of the wreck is the busiest transportation center in New York, perhaps the world.

One of the Worst in History

The tragedy was the second worst in the history of New York rapid transit. Ninety-six persons were killed on November 1, 1918 in the derailment of a Brooklyn rapid transit train running through an open cut in Mallbone street, Brooklyn. On Sept. 31, 1905 12 persons were killed and 42 injured when

Last night's crash occurred on the line of the Interborough rapid transit company, advertised as "the fastest railway in the world" and equipped with all modern safety devices. The train consisted of all steel cars. It carried about 1,

The ninth car of the train was thrown against the concrete wall, was sheered in two, half of it careening 300 feet down the dark tunnel still attached to the train before collapsing, a steel shroud

During Rush Hour
The eighth car also turned over as it was dragged from the track by the weight of the ninth car. The tenth car crashed on into the wreckage but remained upright. With the crash all but the emergency lights on the train went out and the scene was lighted only by the headlights of the cars.
