"Blue Danube" Featured At Arcade Tomorrow

Once in a decade a film actor appears on the cinema horizon who makes on roles, no matter how small, that afford him opportunity to display his talent as a portrayal of dramatic characterizations.

Joseph Schildkraut is one screen player who refuses to rely on his classic profile to keep him constantly before an admiring motion picture public.

His delineation of Judas in Cecil B. de Mille's "The King of Kings" is hailed as one of the most artistic portrayals to reach the screen. Jewish-Irish Film At Colonial Sunday
