FAMOUS VIOLINIST WEDS FLORENCE VIDOR
NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (AP)—Florence Vidor, motion picture star, whose marriage to another film actor ended in divorce court because she said, "I'm not much talent in one family interested with the career of husband and wife, has been married to Jascha Heifetz, world famous concert violinist.
The marriage was performed secretly by Alfred Frankenthaler, supreme court justice, at the Mayfair house on Aug. 26, and news of the event was withheld by the principals until last night when Heifetz surprised his manager with the announcement as he and his bride departed for California.
The bride, who is the mother of a nine-year-old girl, was divorced in Los Angeles three years ago from King Miller, motion picture director. At that time she indicated to the court that talented families tend to "submerge" the individual.
She is 23 years old. Heifetz is 27. This is his first marriage.

ELASTIC TAX LAWS URGED AT TAX MEET
SEATTLE, Aug. 28 (AP)—Elastic freedom to make and amend tax laws was urged by Dr. Harold L. Lutz of Stanford university, president of the National Tax association, which met here last night.
Three hundred and forty-seven delegates, representing 27 states, territories or Canadian Provinces, had gathered for the opening session tonight. More were expected tomorrow.
"The state must be free to change its system to cope with changing conditions," Dr. Lutz declared. "I fully believe that the best solution is best which says the least about taxation.
Similar efforts were voiced here by Governor Roland H. Harris of Washington who welcomed the conference members to the state. The executive declared that there is "too much government and that there is a vital need to call a halt to it."
