Salem Company Has \$60,000 Fire Loss

SALLEM, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—Louis Lachmund, of Salem, owner of the Drager Fruit company which suffered a disastrous fire here early this morning, was reached this afternoon at Independence and roughly estimated the total loss of the fire at about \$60,000. He believes his own loss in building and contents is about \$40,000. The North Pacific Prune Growers' association suffered a loss estimated at from \$20,000 to \$25,000 in stored lumber. The loss was partially covered by insurance. How the fire started is not known.

Troller Nearly Destroyed By Fire

NEWPORT, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—The salmon troller "Bear," owned by Henry Exys and John James of Astoria, narrowly escaped destruction at 8 a. m. today when a gasoline cook stove in the cabin exploded, setting the vessel on fire. Loss to the ship and fishing gear was estimated at one thousand dollars with no insurance. All personal effects of the men were lost. Jaugas and Taylor were aboard at the time of the explosion. PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—Archie Leonard, Portland policeman, was given credit today by his associates for the arrest at Pocatello, Ida., yesterday of Taylor White, negro youth, sought on a charge of murdering M. C. Timony, negro, former of the Tom Johnson ranch near St. Helens. July 24, Leonard had been employed by Johnson to assist in finding Taylor and Carl Shelton, both of whom were suspected of the killing. The Portland officer traced the pair to Idaho and finally thought he had located White at Pocatello. Saturday he asked to take part of his vacation time and visit the Idaho city. The arrest followed and White is quoted as having confessed. Search is now being made for Shelton.
