Roy D'Arcy In Villain Role at Star

For the third time, during the last twelve months Roy D'Arcy, one of the most popular villains on the screen, will be seen as the nemesis of Tim McCoy in one of the latter's Western film productions.

In "Hiders of the Dark," which comes to the Star Theater Friday, D'Arcy will be seen as Mike Flannan, leader of a gang of outlaws investigating a California frontier town in the twenties.

D'Arcy first matched his villainous side against McCoy's film value in "Winners of the Wilderness." In this picture he played the role of the French officer responsible for the slaughter of British and Colonialists at Braddock's defeat.

Later he played the role of the foreign envoy backing the Californians in an uprising against the Americans during the conquest of California. This was in "California."

In "Hiders of the Dark" he is a number and leader of a band of outlaws in a little frontier town, terrorizing peaceful citizens and responsible for the murder of an editor who exposed his villainy.

From Cow-Puncher To Stardom For Jack Holt, Actor

From cow-puncher, film engineer, prospector, freight-carrier and government mail-carrier in Alaska to a screen star is the experience of Jack Holt. The son of an Episcopalian rector and the grandson of Chief Justice Marshall, young Holt was educated in Trinity Prep in New York and later attended a military institute. His first appearance on the stage was in 1915 in Oakland, California.

Jack actually fell into pictures. He was engaged as a stunt rider in 1914 for "Satanstoe Jane" and fractured two ribs in a thirty-five foot drop, off a cliff into the Russian river. From choice he prefers to play Western roles and for over ten years was cast exclusively in productions of this type. His

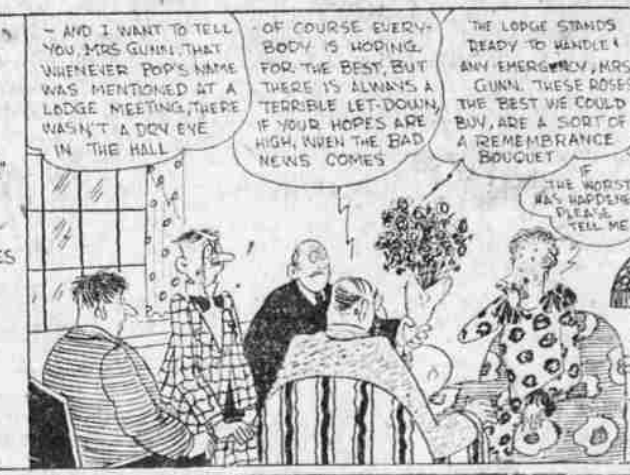
