

SMITH HOPES IN OHIO IN CITIES

Something Unusual Needed to Make the Buckeye State Go Democratic

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 31. (AP)—When Ohio goes democratic in a presidential year there generally is some unusual reason and it is Gov. Alfred E. Smith ticks Herbert Hoover in the state in November it will be largely because Ohio has turned a somersault and gone wet.

The Buckeye state has consistently defeated all proposals smacking of alcohol and elected dry candidates to state and federal offices except a few congressmen in eastern and western districts. In most instances dry majorities have been reversed. Thus far there has been noted little or no change in the tastes of rural Ohio, so if Smith wins the state it probably will be by the vote of the big cities.

Realizing this, democratic leaders expect to exert their efforts chiefly in the urban centers, where they hope to cut the large majority. These majorities will have to aggregate, it generally is estimated, around 100,000 to offset the anticipated rural republican majorities.

"CHAIN GANGS" CLANK THROUGH WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP)—Wall Street witnesses a procession of "chain gangs" twice daily.

They are not prisoners bound to and from jail and camp, but reputable brokers' clerks carrying securities between their offices and the safe deposit vaults of the big banks. Each business morning groups of clerks gather at the leading banks and withdraw their firms' securities. The boxes, varying from three to eight in number, are chained together and carried by the clerks, flanked by armed guards, from one to six blocks through the streets of the financial district.

The chains are used as an additional safeguard against hold-up attempts on the theory that it would be much more difficult for highwaymen to get away with a number of boxes chained together and weighing, in the aggregate, several hundred pounds, than if the words needed to express it.

Auto Helps Philippines

MANILA (AP)—American automobiles are being given credit for development of the Philippine Islands because of their contribution to the cause of good roads, opening of sparsely settled areas with resulting creation of additional sources of wealth and the closer contact assured the island peoples. Average annual income of the population is only about \$24 per capita, but the islands have increased automobile imports from less than 250 in 1916 until nearly 30,000 now are registered.

Cleveland, with almost a million population, Clevelanders like to try new things. Clevelanders showed their independence four years ago by giving La Follette and Wheeler a majority, although the Coolidge ticket swept the state by almost half a million majority.

H. C. Brunner, democratic chairman, therefore sees in Cleveland great possibilities for the Smith-Robinson ticket. If he can once get the voters headed toward Smith he feels nothing can stop Smith sweeping the city.

Although the prohibition question is expected to be the dominating issue in Ohio, as heretofore, it probably will not be dragged into the open. To outward appearance the campaign will be conducted along lines stressing the tariff and other economic issues. The matter of farm relief is not expected to be a vital issue.

Neither party will be able to set up working organizations until after the state primary, August 14, when new state committees then select executive or campaign committees to conduct the campaign. The republicans have several

committee contests developed along the same line of cleavage as in the April presidential primary between the followers of former Sen. Frank B. Willis and those supporting the Hoover cause. The Hoover element is expected to win, as it was able to carry a majority of the districts in April. Such a victory would mean the selection of a campaign organization that will put in its best legs for the Hoover-Curtis ticket.

Another factor expected to be of considerable importance in the campaign is the election of two United States senators, one for the full term and one to fill the four-year vacancy caused by the death of Senator Willis. The senatorial campaign undoubtedly will be closely allied with the presidential. Sen. Simon D. Pons, a dry, unopposed for re-nomination, will carry the Hoover banner, although he was allied with the Willis group last April. His opponent, despite that five are seeking the democratic nomination, probably will be either George White of Marietta, former congressman, or Charles V. Traux, state director of agriculture.

For the short term, Sen. Cyrus L. Cochran, a recognized dry, who succeeded Senator Willis, is fighting it out with Graham P. Hunt, Cincinnati, a past leader of the wets of the Volstead law. Rep. Theodore E. Burton, Cleveland, and Chief Justice, Garretson T. Marshall, Zanesville, are favorites in a field of five for the republican short term nomination. Both Burton and Marshall are considered dry, and Marshall the drier. Burton probably will be the target of the irreconcilable Willis followers, who blame him with being responsible chiefly for Hoover contesting Senator Willis' bid for the Ohio delegation to the Kansas City convention. Charles Dick of Akron and "General" Jacob S. Coxey of "Coxey's Army" fame also are candidates.

SWISS IMPORTING HONEY

BERNE (AP)—Switzerland, which during the first half of 1928 bought from the United States more than 80,000 of the 400,000 pounds of honey imported, is expected to be in the market shortly for increased quantities of high quality honey for hotel use.
