Bridge Pointers

For the last few Mondays we have been considering what strength is needed to justify an informative double; but, if being impossible to take up all points simultaneously, we have not yet been able to refer to one that is very important.

An informative double is made with the hope that it may produce an answer from the partner which, fitting with the doubling hand, will result in making a game. As an adversary has been strong enough to bid a Minor answer produces a game-going result much less frequently than a Major answer—especially when the original bid was No Trump. Consequently the informative double is an invitation to the partner to bid a Major. The partner is expected to accept this invitation whenever he has at least four cards of a Major even if he has a stronger four-card or five-card Minor.

At a loss, score the difference between making gains at a Major (10 tricks) and at a Minor (11 tricks) is really an enormous one; and answering the double with any four-card Major in preference to a stronger Minor, works most satisfactorily in actual play. For example, when the doubler's partner holds Spades 5-N-X-X and Clubs A-K-J-9, he should answer the informative double of a Heart, a Diamond or a No Trump with one or two Spades, as might be needed, and not with the stronger Club suit. As an informative double may produce an answer based on four weak Hearts or Spades, the double should not be made unless such answer would fit with the doubling hand; or unless the doubler has a refuge to which he can fly if the answers do not please him. Suppose South bids No Trump, and West bids:

No. 1	No. 2
♠ A-Q-10-X	X-X
♥ K-Q-X-X	K-Q-X-X
♦ A-10-X	A-10-X
♣ X-X	A-Q-10-X

No. 1 would be an ideal hand for doubling because a Major answer (either Hearts or Spades) would work satisfactorily; No. 2 could not stand a Spade answer, but the doubler can take refuge in two No Trumps, so a double could be made with No. 2 also.

ART VALUED AT \$50,000 IS STORED IN BASEMENT

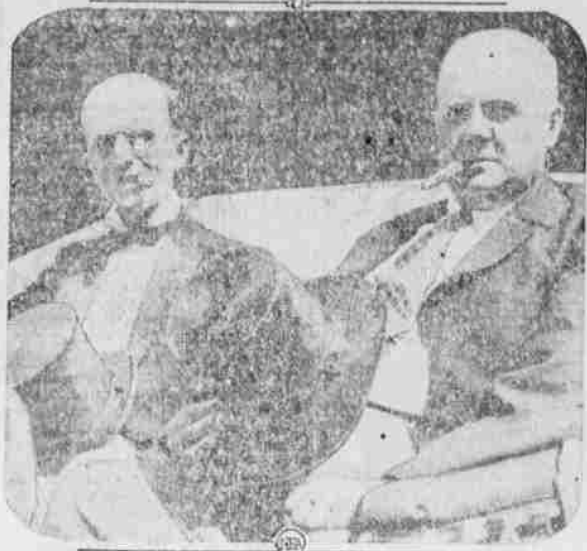
GALESBURG, Ill. (AP)—A \$50,000 art collection, housed since the Elks club eliminated the insurance on it to reduce expenses, is stored in a Galesburg basement, unwanted.

The paintings belong to George S. Dole, son of James H. Dole, former millionaire grain dealer of Chicago and a vice president of the Chicago art institute. George S. Dole inherited the collection.

The paintings were loaned to the Elks club here in 1914 and Dole was voted a life membership. When the building was redecorated this year the canvases were turned back to Dole. None of the Galesburg public institutions would accept the art treasures as they were packed and stored.

The largest and most valuable canvas in the collection is a fishing scene by Frank Hogg. It was painted in 1885 and was shown at the Columbian exposition in 1893. Anna V. Shaw, first woman admitted to the art institute, is represented by a landscape painting. J. Francis Murphy, landscape painter, and Walter Shirlaw, painter and designer, are among the other artists.

OLE FROM PEXOS WELLS COULD OVERFLOW RIVER

SAN ANGELO, Tex. (AP)—Seven oil wells on the banks of the Pecos river would flood the valley if their potential flow were turned into the stream.

The 11 mammoth producers in the Yates field, have a capacity output of 1,193,162 barrels every 24 hours. More than one-third of the capacity flow of the entire field is represented in these 16 wells. However, production is curtailed because of the low price of crude oil. California No. 16 is the best well in the field. Its flow is 121,697 barrels daily.

The well with which the Yates pool was discovered last year began with only 100 barrels of oil a day. When it was drilled 18 feet deeper—down to 1,950 feet—the flow of oil increased 500 fold.

It is a shallow pool, for many oil wells in the southwest are a mile deep.

UTAH'S LOVE OF SEAGULL CHANGES TO HATEFULNESS

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The seagull, once esteemed in Utah, is not so popular now. Some 20 years ago when Mormonism was threatened with a crop devastation due to an invasion of swarms of seagulls, the grateful birds were kept in from the

Pacific ocean, devoured the insect pests and averted a possible famine.

To show their appreciation Utahans erected a monument in honor of their winged friends. A great gilt, sculptured with spread wings, is perched at the top.

Now, the farmers complain. Flocks of the birds make their home near Salt Lake and sail out into the fields to gorge themselves on cherries, other fruits and grain crops. They are so ravenous and hold they can scarcely be shaken out of a fruit tree.

There is growing demand that the law protecting gulls be repealed, and the bitterness of some farmers is such that they advocate tearing down the seagull monument.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Blackberries, cereal, creamed smoked fish, toasted graham rolls, milk, coffee.
LUNcheon—Cream of celery soup, toasted cheese crackers, banana and tomato salad, apple tapioca pudding, lemonade.

DINNER—Parsley butter, potatoes in parsley butter, creamed cauliflower, head lettuce with Russian dressing, cherry pie, milk, coffee.

Some cooks think a tablespoon of vinegar added to the berries improves an elderberry pie. Other cooks hold that a pinch of salt, plenty of sugar and thorough baking insure a delicious pie.

Warm Over Mutton

Two cups sliced cold roast mutton, 4 small onions, 3 tablespoons butter or drippings, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 cup chopped tomatoes, 4 anchovies (optional), 1 dessert-spoonful paprika, 1 teaspoon mixed dried herbs, 2 lemons, 3 cups stock.

Melt butter, drippings or oil and add onions, thinly sliced. Cook over a low fire until onions are golden brown and add four 8-oz. until perfectly blended and add tomatoes, anchovies, paprika, mixed herbs stock and juice of lemons. Cook until the mixture is reduced about one-third. Rub through a colander boiler and cook over boiling water for one hour or longer. The water should be kept just below the boiling point.

If anchovies are not used, salt must be added with the seasoning.
