WASHINGTON—Republican headquarters announced Hoover will speak at Carnegie Hall, New York, on October 11 and make address in Boston on date yet to be fixed; committee considering invasion of south.

NEW YORK—National Democratic Chairman Raskob, returning from Robinson nomination, said he had received assurances Smith would carry Illinois, Indiana and Ohio.

Hood River And Albany To Need More Workmen

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 5 (Special)—Following a report according to districts or location of seasonal employment conditions in Oregon.

Portland—Chiefs are still coming in for vegetable, fruit and hop pickers and there is no difficulty experienced in filling all orders as we have a large surplus of workers on hand.

Polson—Evergreen, blackberries and Kentucky Wonder bean picking is in full swing. Peach growers are starting to gather their crop and pear picking has been on for a week. Early hops are being picked and we have a surplus on hand to handle all work.

Hopkins—Crate freshening is well along, clover hulling is starting. Early hops are being picked, but the demand will be for the late crop, for which picking will start in the early part of September. There is usually a good demand for pickers for the late hop crop.

Albany—Hay baling and threshing are going on. Pear and peach picking are in progress and blackberry picking which will begin soon. Picking of early hops begins this week and late hops about the middle of September. There is a possibility of shortage of pickers in the hop fields.

Corvallis—Harvest of hay and grain is still on, though nearly finished. There is a light crop of beans. We have sufficient help to fill all needs.

Hood River—There are a few more transients here than can be placed just at present but they can be used later when we will begin to harvest a large crop of apples about September 15th. We will not be able to handle this crop locally and will need a great deal of outside help.

The Dalles—Picking of peaches, pears and prunes are in full swing and we have sufficient help to handle the crops.

Medford—The pear harvest is on in full swing and we have a surplus of labor to handle the crop and expect this surplus to continue.

Assembly Passes West Amendment

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Sept. 5 (AP)—The state assembly today unanimously passed the West constitutional amendment No. 1, supporting the California tax commission's recommendations relative to taxation of incomes of banks and corporations operating in California and of individuals. Seventy-two votes were cast.

Turkey Crop Big In Douglas County

DOUGLAS CO., Ore., Sept. 5 (AP)—Douglas county will have approximately 15,000 turkeys for the Thanksgiving and Christmas markets this year, present estimates indicate. Fairly good prices last year, coupled with the fact that the present season has been a good one for the maturity of turkeys, with a small percentage of loss, has resulted in a larger crop than normal.

All conditions have been good for the raising of turkeys this year, and the birds are heavy and in prime condition. Many of the growers expect to have a heavier bill for the Thanksgiving season than usual.

VICTIMINE, Wyo., Sept. 5 (AP)—An oil barrel used as a float, set by H. A. Collins, during "ditch" work, which was part of the cargo on the ship which crashed yesterday at Poncha, Wyo., killed seven persons, was forced down last night 11 miles west of here, without injury to the pilot or the two passengers.

Cooke Trial Set For September 17

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 5 (AP)—Pleas of not guilty were entered in circuit court here yesterday by James P. Cooke, Charles S. Goodwin and Howard Philpott, in indictments charging the three men with embezzlement of shares of stock belonging to clients of the now defunct brokerage firm of Overbeck and Cooke. Cooke was president of the firm, Goodwin, secretary, and Philpott, treasurer. Circuit Judge Kammer set all of the cases, including two other charges for which indictments long ago were filed, for trial Sept. 17.

WINS RIFLE TITLE

CAMP PERRY, O., Sept. 5 (AP)—A. P. Fredericks, a civilian of Kings Mills, O., was announced today as the winner of the National Rifle association rapid fire championship, finished late yesterday. Fredericks scored 37 out of a possible 100.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 5 (AP)—Lyon I. The extortion charge later was dismissed. Police said he threatened to injure the actress' mother unless she paid \$2,000.

Make Attempt To Find Lost Fliers

ROME, Sept. 5 (AP)—The dirigible N-5, a sister ship of the lost Italia, is being prepared for a final attempt to locate those of the Italia's crew last seen with the gas bag, says Glorioso Italia today. The dirigible will have Malbach motors and in a few technical details will differ from its ill-fated predecessor. It is said General Nobile himself is supervising the work and it is expected that the N-5 will be taken to the Champano flying field before the end of the week.

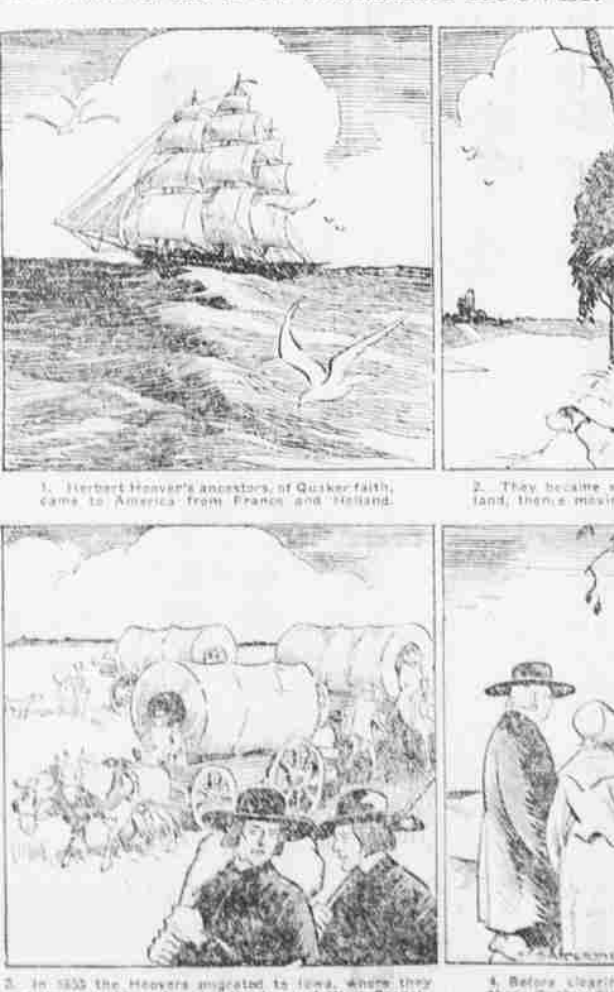
