But she admitted that at the moment there were two seemingly insurmountable obstacles to win.

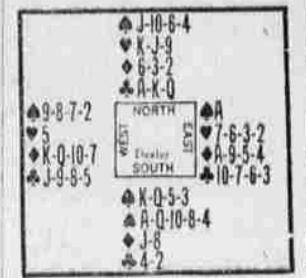

Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series started on Tuesday of Auction Bridge deals in which the bidding and contract is stated, and one or two questions are asked concerning the play, today's deal is:



The Bidding
South West North East
1 Heart Pass Pass Pass
2 South becomes the Declarer; contract one Heart.

The Questions
1. What four cards should be played to trick 1?
2. What card should be led to trick 2?
3. What card should be led to trick 3?
4. What card should be led to trick 4?

Answer Blank
(Readers are urged to fill this blank before looking at the answers.)

- To trick 1, West should lead North should play East should play South should play
- The lead to trick 2 should be
- The lead to trick 3 should be
- The lead to trick 4 should be

The Answers

- The cards played to trick 1 should be: West, King of Diamonds; North, Deuce of Diamonds; South, Jack of Diamonds; East overcalls. West's trick because, holding a singleton Ace of Spades, there is a chance of saving game by a Spade ruff. West has not been strong enough to bid although holding King and Queen of Diamonds. Dummy has great strength so that the game is in serious danger. It can be saved if South has two Diamonds (West's led of King shows that he holds Queen). South plays the Jack of Diamonds as a false card, trying to deceive East.
- East leads the Ace of Spades. Although South's Jack play may worry East seriously, he appreciates that it may have been a false card. His best chance is to carry out his pre-announced plan.
- East should lead the Four of Diamonds. If South has been false-carding, this will put West in the lead.
- West should lead a Spade. East's over-lead of the King of Diamonds followed by the lead of the Ace of Spades and then a Diamond, marks East with a desire to ruff Spades.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Sliced peaches, potatoes with ready-to-serve cereal, cream, fish and potato hash, celery, Graham muffins, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Onions in cream on toast, ham and potato salad, eye bread, lemonade.

DINNER—Fish baked in tomato sauce, rice timbales, creamed peppers, green tomato pie, milk, coffee.

Match-like strips of cold boiled ham vastly improve a potato salad. Finely chopped carrots and cauliflower hearts are also used uncooked to advantage.

Green Tomato Pie

One and one-half pounds green tomatoes, 1 cup sugar, 1/2 cup water, 1 lemon, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1 baked pie shell.

When making dough for pie shell, make half as much extra as would be required as for an upper crust. About 1 1/2 cups flour will be needed.

Wash tomatoes and cut in slices. Make a syrup of water and sugar, add tomatoes, grated rind and juice of lemon and cinnamon. Cook until tomatoes are transparent but unbroken. Add raisins and cook until raisins are plump. Turn into a baked pie shell, arrange strips of dough to make a lattice top, and bake until top is brown.

Irregular Hemline Moves To Hat Brims

PARIS (AP)—Irregularly seems to be catching in the style world. Hat brims have caught the spirit from hemlines and winter millinery is more apt to be long on one side and short on the other. It is almost sure to be.

Sometimes the eccentricity takes the form of a long back brim and short front, though usually it is manifested by uneven, wavy sides, shortened back and medium front. Large and small hats seem to be worn on the back of the head, due to a trade trick of joining brim and crown so that the forehead is bare.

The winter millinery arrives to be a team for the face and not a refuge of eye shade as it has sometimes seemed to be in seasons past. Since the alterations of the dressing table rediscovered the satisfying qualities of ruffles and waving hair, milliners are capitalizing the discovery.

Sometimes the sides of the hat brims are pulled in so close to the face that the effect is that of a poke bonnet, which is exactly the name Paris has given this new shape. Occasionally the poke bonnet loses its brim and becomes a plain bonnet or head, French for baby's bonnet. In that case it may even lie under the chin.

The leading hat material is long-haired silk plush. Next comes felt, which may also be long-haired, sometimes shaggy on one side and furry on the other. Some velvet is seen, combined with felt or used alone. There is a smattering of toques made of shaved short-haired furs and hatmakers predict an increasing vogue of fur toques and berets.

More financing than has been seen in winter hats for many seasons is visible right now in Paris. Some of it is flat for applied in motifs, or draped bands. Flat or trich, worked in a variety of ways, velvet applique and lame incrustations are other trimming ideas.

Prince of Wales And Brother To Shoot Big Game

LONDON, Sept. 6. (AP)—The Prince of Wales and his younger brother, the Duke of Gloucester, left London at 2:45 p. m. today en route for a big game hunt, traveling to Dover on an ordinary train. They will cross to France and after traveling through that country will sail from Marseilles.

For days the two adventurers and popular sons of King George have been busy packing for the trip while the newspapers of London have been carrying accounts and pictures of the regions and the black people they will see.

Sailing from Marseilles the prince and his brother will go to Alexandria and then to Cairo and from there by motor to Jamalliya on the Nile canal. Here the British India steamer Malda will embark them for Mombasa, and there they will entrain for the interior of Kenya.

Their baggage includes many fine sporting fire arms and many an uncounted beast now roaming the native wilds is destined to fall before the aim of the imperial hunters before Christmas finds them ready to return with the trophies of the chase.
