TESTIMONY GIVEN BY TWO STATES

Boise and Spokane Men on Witness Stand at Lewiston Hearing

LEWISTON, Ida., Sept. 6. (AP)—Another attempt of Union Pacific Railroad counsel to expunge from the records an industrial survey of Asotin county was overruled today at the Snake River hearing of the interstate commerce commission. This exhibit shows that there is now no room in the county for large industrial interests needing large acreage and trackage.

C. W. Nelson, Spokane, of the Eggers Lumber Supply company, told how the proposed Snake river bridge, to be built at here, would give advantage to shippers of cedar poles in the Clearwater region, in the southern market over-shippers to the north. He estimated that there were 3,000,000 feet of cedar poles in the Clearwater region, shipped mostly from Asotin, to the coast of here. This company now handles more than a thousand carloads yearly.

Ben E. Bush, of Moscow, state forester, confirmed testimony on the cedar pole stands and told of considerable timber in Snake river territory which can be logged but not brought down the river. With the railroad, he testified, it would be possible to float the logs down Salmon river to Snake, and impound them with a dam holding 100,000,000 feet. He declared there was much good timber on the upper slopes of Salmon river.
