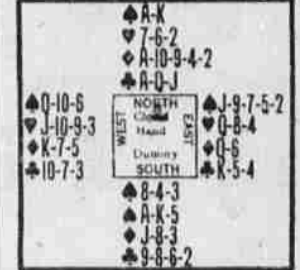

Bridge Pointers

Contract Bridge
Continuing our Friday-Saturday series of Auction and Contract Bridge hands in which questions of bidding and play are analyzed; today's hand follows:



No. 7. Contract Bidding

South pass, West pass, North two No Trumps, East pass, South three No Trumps. The doubtful bid is North's; the question being whether he should bid two No Trumps Third Hand. With a count of 17 and four suits stopped, or 15 with three suits stopped and three cards in the untrumped suit, Dealer could bid two No Trumps; but there is some question whether this license should be extended to Third Hand. The best opinion favors the bid.

There is no question concerning South's jump to three No Trumps. With his count of 8 he would not be strong enough to jump a Dealer from one to two; but it takes only 6 to justify a jump from two to three.

Auction Bridge Bidding
South pass, West pass, North one No Trump, followed by three passes.

The Play
East would lead the Five of Spades. Declarer, taking the trick, would count four tricks in the two Major suits and no more. To make game he must get five tricks in the Minors before the adversaries establish and run a suit. There is no possibility of doing this with clubs, using the Ace of Diamonds as an extra trick, but there is with Diamonds and the Ace of Clubs. The clever dealer need not lead Diamonds from Closed Hand, as he probably would lose two Diamond tricks and have the Spades established against him before his Diamonds could be run. He does not wish to unguard Hearts, in which the adversaries have more cards than he; but it is his only chance. He puts Dummy in with a Heart, leads a Diamond from Dummy and finessees. When the finesse loses and his last Spade stopper is taken out, he repeats the process of putting Dummy in with a Heart (giving up his last Heart stopper), and leads a second Diamond from Dummy for a second finesse. This will give him game if the King and Queen of Diamonds are not both in the East hand, and the chances are against that distribution. In the above hand, played in this way, Declarer would make two Spades, two Hearts, four Diamonds and one Club.

This dinner menu is ideal for hot weather. The appetizer and salad take care of the meat problem as well as adding vegetables to the menu.

Sweet Corn Souffle
One and one-half cups sweet corn cut from cobs, 1 teaspoon sugar, 5/8 teaspoon salt, 1-5/8 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 cup milk, 4 eggs.

To cut corn from cobs, score down through the center of each row of kernels. Cut off tops with sharp knife. With the blunt edge of the knife scrape out the milk and heart. Mix and sift flour, sugar, salt and pepper; mix corn, stir with fork until thoroughly blended. Add milk and yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Fold in whites, as beaten until stiff and dry. Turn mixture into a well buttered baking dish and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. When firm to the touch, the souffle is done. Serve at once from baking dish.
