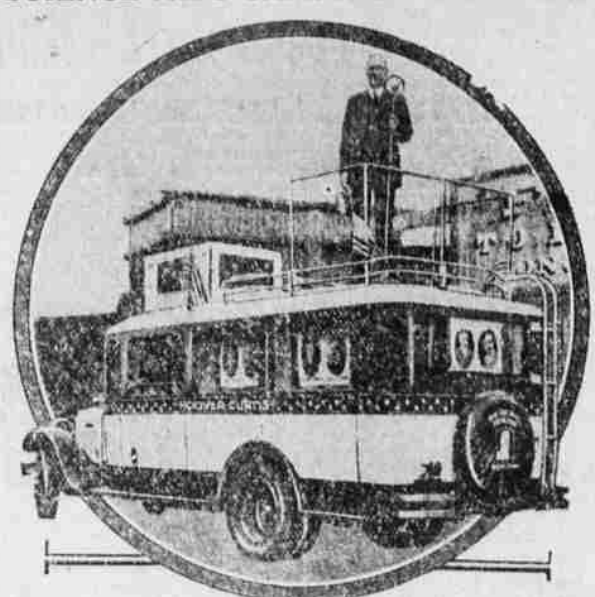

Objections To Exhibits Fail In Rail Hearing

LEWISTON, Ida., Sept. 7 (AP)—Over the objection of railroad counsel, H. O. Berger, Seattle traffic expert, entered four exhibits at the Upper Snake River railroad hearing today showing the estimated revenue that would accrue to the proposed line.

One exhibit estimated the annual traffic to be received at Clarkston through Lewiston after the fifth year at 2,941 carsloads, another reported the forwarded traffic from Lewiston would be 2,213 carsloads.

After the fifth year, Berger said, the orchard lands along the Snake and Grande Ronde rivers would each year increase in production by 1832 carsloads on a basis of each 400 acres. Other exhibits entered over the objection of opposing counsel gave the summary revenue to the proposed line if an extension was granted to Rousesburg and the revenues on a basis of O. W. R. & N. and Union Pacific mileage rates.
