MENUS

BREAKFAST—Peaches, cereal, cream, scrambled eggs with rice, crisp toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Baked stuffed tomatoes, hearts of lettuce, blackberry snow, milk, tea.
DINNER—Cream of corn soup, cold baked ham, sweetened potatoes, apple and celery salad, sweet potato pie, milk, coffee.
An easy way to eat peaches when they are served "au naturel" for breakfast is to cut them in halves and eat with a spoon, just the way temperamental children are handled.

Blackberry Snow
Cook until tapioca is clear and of cup water, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup sugar, 2 cups milk, 1 cup whipping cream, 2 cups blackberries.
Soak tapioca in salt and water for two hours. Drain off any surplus water. Put in top of double boiler and add milk and sugar. Cook until tapioca is clear and of a soft jelly-like consistency. Add more milk if tapioca becomes too thick. Chill for several hours and when ready to serve fold in cream whipped until firm. Add berries and serve at once.

Silk Crepe Slippers

PARIS CAPS—Crepe de chine has replaced satin as the smart material for evening shoes in Paris. Only dull gold, or black satin, is holding its place for evening slippers. The lady shoes which are matched, or contrasted, with the delicately shaded velvet, hose and silk, indicated as fall's first choice for evening wear, are of a heavy quality of crepe de chine called crepe mongol.
Gold and silver kid slippers are still the first favorites for the hours of electric lights and gaiety.

Decolletes Lower On Evening Dress

PARIS (AP)—The fashion makers have achieved the apparently impossible and lowered the neckline of formal evening dresses.

The smartest of the new dresses designed for the night hours are as heavily beaded as possible. Their cut makes the wear of lingerie difficult, if not impossible, sometimes. Jewel and diamond straps take a place of importance in the evening mode of winter. On flesh-colored neck brilliant and colored stones stand out strikingly against the effect of low decolletes. Carved or polished jade, and some coral, also is used for shoulder bands.

In contrast with the beaded strap is the molting tulle shoulder band of flesh color, still used by some important houses, although its vogue is less than it was four months ago.

Most evening dresses are cut with only moderately low necklines in front and exaggeratedly low V or T decolletes in back. Very often the bodice comes, surprise fashion in back and the top surface is pulled to the side to form a puff or draped bustle from which a long and design to the floor. Leading houses design dresses of this type in velvet, taffeta and chiffon trimmed with the finest of chenille lace.

Hemlines, in many instances, follow the dip of necklines and just clear the floor in back. On other models the length is at the sides, particularly in dresses with circular skirts.

Sometimes used as an embroidery on velvet evening dresses, but as a whole comparatively little jeweled embroidery appears, except an ornamental shoulder strap and possibly a motif on the front of the bodice.

CHENILLE LACES MAKE ENTRY IN WINTER STYLE
PARIS (AP)—Velvet reaches its most subtle form in winter fashion now being shown here, in chenille lace, which is lace of heavy wool with figures worked in velvet thread.

Whole evening dresses, and sometimes jackets to match, are made of the chenille lace. One famous dressmaker uses only that form of chenille lace, with elegant designs worked out in myriad little balls of chenille of graduated sizes.

Bridge Pointers

One important question arises frequently in Auction Bridge, and yet outside of expert circles there is the most general misunderstanding concerning it. It turns up whenever an initial No Trump is passed by the adversary on the left of the No Trump, and the partner of the No Trump is called upon to decide whether the No Trump should be passed by him and probably played, or whether he should overcall with a suit-bid.

The many mistakes made by players who initially bid No Trump when a suit is the best declaration that the hand contains, are equalled by as many mistakes made by players who take out their partner's No Trump when there is no sound excuse or justification for so doing.

Among those who lack expert knowledge and even conception of the requirements of the game, the alleged idea is prevalent that, every No Trump is bid to be taken out; the theory apparently being that, if the No Trump is not strong enough to go back to two No Trumps, he is so weak that he should be "rescued." Some limit the take out to hands with a five-card suit, while others go to the perfectly ridiculous extreme of always taking out partner's No Trump even when it has to be done with a four-card suit. It is obvious that when a No Trump is taken out as a matter of course, the bid conveys no information of value to the No Trump partner concerning the length or strength of the take-out suit or the general strength or weakness of the partner's hand.

The fact is that a No Trump rarely should be disturbed by the partner. It is the shortest road to the goal. When the bidding side is without a score, a game can be made at No Trump by the winning of only nine tricks; but it takes 10 in a Major suit or 11 in a Minor to produce the same result. Consequently the partner who has started along the shortest highway should not be switched off unless for one of the two following reasons:

(a) The probability that the combined hands can go game in a suit and yet be unable to do so in a No Trump. A take-out under such circumstances is known as a strength take-out.

(b) The probability, due to the weakness of the partner's hand, that No Trump would produce dire results; and that a take-out with a long but weak suit will result in a smaller loss. This is the only justifiable "rescue."

The consideration of No Trump take-outs will be continued next Monday.
