GIANTS WIN BUT OUTLOOK CLOUDY

Clan McGraw Faces Possible Elimination Due to Double Headers

In the excitement over Connie Mack's bid for the American league pennant, the desperate battle waged by Hyatt's crew has been somewhat overlooked for the last week or so.

While the Athletics and the Yankees had an off-day yesterday, the Giants had a doubleheader at the Polo Grounds, the New York Giants inaugurated their four-day eight-game series here by taking both ends of a doubleheader with the Braves and putting themselves back into the thick of the running.

This double victory for the clan McGraw combined with defeats for St. Louis and Chicago, left the Giants only a single percentage point back of the Cubs and three games removed from the league leading Cardinals.

May Eliminate Giants

Notwithstanding the story the standing tell, the Giants are far from sure with virtual elimination from the race. They are confronted with the task of playing three more doubleheaders with the Braves in as many days and the manager who can get better than an even break out of that arrangement deserves a vote of commendation. Pitching, of course, is the principal problem when doubleheaders pile up.

First, Plummer, scattered the Braves' seven hits in the upper and won, 4 to 1. Joe Genewich hit his old Boston comrades down with three hits in the nightcap and the Giants capped, hands down, 11 to 6.

Carls Lose Again

Bowing to the Cincinnati Reds, 7 to 2, in the morning series, the Cardinals lost their third straight game but kept intact their two and a half game lead over the second place Cubs who gracefully dropped one to the Pittsburgh Pirates, 7 to 5.

Eight pitchers were on display as the Pirates turned back the Cubs, 7 to 5 and only Burleigh Grimes and Charley Root were effective, Grimes hanging up his 23rd victory of the year at last.

Brooklyn and Philadelphia divided a doubleheader. The Phils took the opener, 11 to 6, with the aid of Charlie Klein's home run and three singles. William Watson Clark pitched the Robins to victory in the closing engagement, 7 to 2.

White Sox Win Ninth

With the two leaders idle, the American league program was featured by the Chicago White Sox triumph over Detroit, 8 to 4, their ninth victory in their last ten games. Vernon Fisher allowed only one earned run—Harry Hollmann's homer in the eighth.

Washington ended its home season just as it opened it—by losing to the Boston Red Sox. The only difference was in the score. They lost the opening game, 7 to 3, and yesterday's 5 to 2.

Blackholder was given excellent support in the critical moments and St. Louis defeated Cleveland, 5 to 3, it being the Indians eighth straight reverse.

Oregon Expects To Play 2 Games With Hawaiians

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 11 (AP)—An invitation to play two football games in Honolulu has been extended to the University of Oregon 1928 varsity. The games would be played on Christmas and New Year's day, unless something now unforeseen intervenes, the invitation will be accepted.

The Oregon team is the first from the American mainland ever to receive a second invitation to Honolulu. The Webfoot varsity played in the islands in 1925.

According to the official invitation, the first game, on Christmas day, would be with the Honolulu All-Stars, a picked team, the second game, on New Year's day, would be with the University of Hawaii team which Oregon defeated in 1923, but which has defeated a number of aggregations from the mainland.

The final decision on the trip will not be made until the end of the month. A faculty tutor must accompany the team to see that all players keep up on their studies. Only students in best scholastic standing will be permitted to consider the trip.

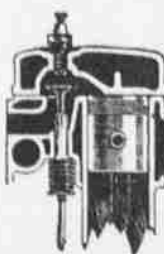

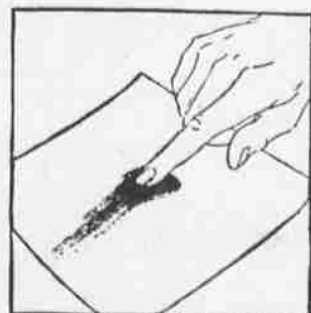
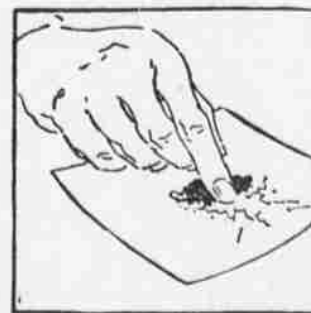
