MENUS

By Sister Mary

BREAKFAST — Orange juice, cereal, cream, crisp bacon, cinnamon toast with apples, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Macaroni, loaf, Boston brown bread, shredded cabbage with lemon juice, rolled oats cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER — Fish chowder, scalloped tomatoes and beans, cucumber and onion salad, rice and pear pudding, milk, coffee.

With the exception of the fish chowder used in the dinner, there are no dishes suggested that could not be served to children as young as four years. The cabbage should be very finely shredded and served with plenty of olive oil with the lemon juice.

Rice and Pear Pudding

Four fine ripe pears, 1-2 cup rice, 2 cups milk, 3 eggs, 3-4 cup sugar, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla, 2 tablespoons powdered sugar.

Wash pears through many waters and cook in slightly salted boiling water for 20 minutes. Let water cook away as much as possible without burning rice. Beat 2 whole eggs and one yolk until very light. Add sugar, milk and vanilla and continue beating. Add rice and mix well. Pare pears, cut in halves and remove cores. Arrange cut side up in a buttered baking dish. Pour over and around rice mixture. Bake in a moderate oven until rice is firm to the touch. It will take about 40 minutes. Beat remaining white of egg until stiff and dry. Beat in powdered sugar. Cover pudding with this mixture and return to a slow oven to puff and brown the meringue. Serve warm or cold, with or without whipped cream.

Bridge Pointers

As has been announced, we start today a series of fifty Bridge questions which will cover a broad line of bidding and play. Each day a hand will be given, and the questions concerning it submitted; the reader should fill up the answer blank before going further, and then read the answers which follow.

Deal A.

♠	3-2
♥	4-1
♦	9-8
♣	10-4-3

NORTH

♠	4-10
♥	10-2
♦	1-5
♣	4-3-2

SOUTH

Question No. 1. If South bid one No Trump and West pass, what should North declare with the above hand?

Question No. 2. If South obtain the contract at No Trump and west lead the Five of Diamonds, what cards should Declarer play on the first trick?

Question No. 3. What card should be led to trick 2?

Answer Blank

Answers

1. North should pass. To bid two Clubs would show a hand that probably contains six worthless clubs and gives no assistance for a No Trump. The above North hand may materially aid the No Trump and is not the type with which a weakness take-out should be made.

2. North should play the Eight of Diamonds. South the Ace, Declarer, by subtracting five from eleven, finding the remainder to be six, and noting that he has six Diamonds in his two hands, higher than the card led, can be sure that East has no higher Diamond and that Dummy's Eight can take this trick. It is important, however, to set up an extra entry in Dummy so as to insure winning four Club Aces also has two small Clubs with it and holds up the Ace until the third Club round. The only way to obtain the desired Dummy entry is by playing the Diamond Ace on the first trick in spite of the fact that Dummy's Eight of Diamonds is a winner.

3. Closed Hand should lead the King of Clubs to start the establishment of that suit.
