George Von Elm Eliminated From Amateur Tourney

BRAE BURN COUNTRY CLUB, Newton, Mass., Sept. 12 (AP)—George Von Elm of Detroit, 1926 champion and one of the tournament's biggest favorites, was the victim of a sensational upset in the opening round of the national amateur golf championship today.

He was beaten by Arthur W. (Ducky) Yates of Rochester, N. Y., by a margin of 3 to 2 in the first 18 hole match of the day and summarily eliminated.

Playing par golf in a drizzling rain, Yates obtained an early lead on Von Elm, made the turn at the ninth three up and settled the issue on the sixteenth to eliminate the player who had been generally expected to reach the finals and there meet the defending champion, Bobby Jones.

Two more seeded stars fell when John Dawson of Chicago put out his fellow townsman and former champion, Chick Evans, 2 and 1. Phil Dr. O. W. Wilting of Portland, Ore., conquered Watts Gunn of Atlanta, 4 and 3.

The marathon match between Don Moe, young Portland, Ore., star, and Phil Perkins, British title holder, was decided on the twenty-second hole when Perkins, with a par 4 to Moe's 5, emerged the victor by a margin of one up.

The fourth former national champion to meet his Waterloo in the opening round fell when Francis Outen, Boston, favorite, lost to young Phillip Finlay, a fellow townsman, 2 up. Outen, after leading at the turn by 2 up, frittered away his chances on the last three holes with wild iron play and poor putting.

BABE RUTH SINKS ATHLETICS HOPES

Philadelphia Making Last Stand Today—Giants Back in Second Place

Caught in a withering barrage of Yankee hits, Connie Mack's pennant aspirations, close to realization a few short days ago, apparently are dying a slow and painful death.

To the mangled attack of the Yankees led by the peerless Babe Ruth, can be attributed the partial collapse of the all American's hopes for his first pennant victory since 1914.

Philadelphia's first pitch, fouled and took a called ball before driving the third pitch into the right field stands as 56,000 fans broke into a delicious demonstration of joy.

The victory sent the Yankees into a two and a half game lead in the standings and assured them of invading the west in first place regardless of the outcome of the fourth and final game of the series today.

In the other American League engagement, the St. Louis Browns beat Cleveland, 19 to 6, in a game which saw 14 doubles pounded out and Detroit defeated Chicago, 7 to 6, when John Stone, recent outfielder, cracked out a home run with two on base in the eighth.

Giants Back in Second

Taking their second double header in as many days from the Boston Braves, the New York Giants ousted the Chicago Cubs from second place in the National league race.

The St. Louis Cardinals retained their two and a half game lead over the field by routing Cincinnati, 6 to 2. The Reds established a new National league record for double plays with 175 but that didn't help them in scoring runs.

The Cubs cracked five Pittsburgh homers for 41 hits and retained away with a 3 to 2 victory. Phil Malone had only one bad inning—the third—when the Pirates sniped all their runs.

The Hobbs took the first by 5 to 2 but dropped the second 4 to 3 when Fred Lohr, of Philadelphia, clubbed the first offering of Bazy Vance, a relief pitcher, into the stands for a home run.

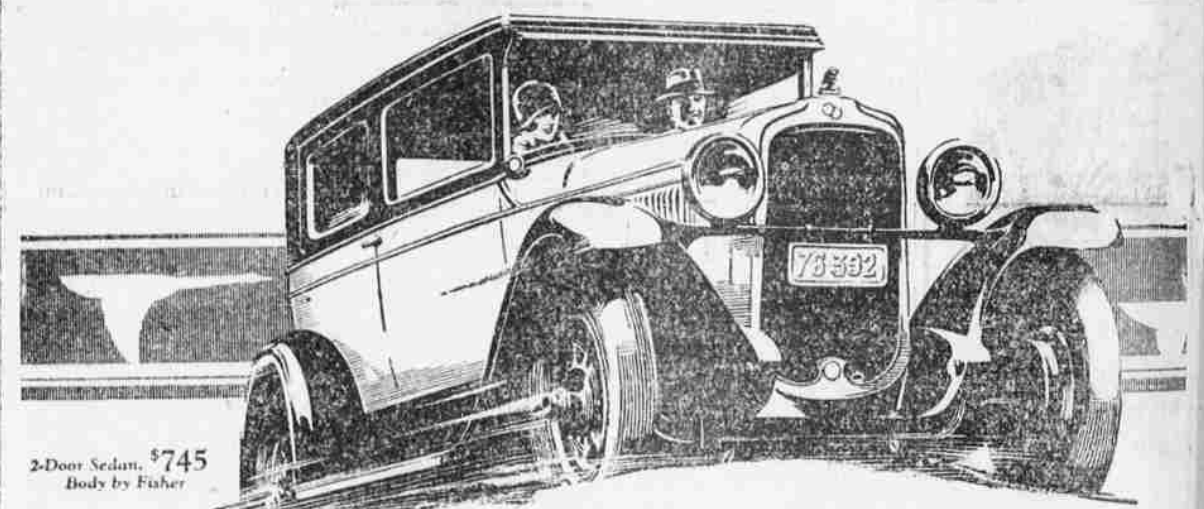
