MENUS

By Sister Mary.
BREAKFAST—Cantaloupes, cereal, cream, creamed fresh beef, crisp bean toast, milk, coffee.
LUNCHEON—Corn a la Creole, lettuce sandwiches, peach custard, milk, tea.
DINNER—Veal stew with dumplings, fried chicken, squash, fresh pear and cheese ball salad, elderberry pie, milk, coffee.
Peanut butter can be added to the cream cheese used with the dinner salad. Work with peanut butter until soft with cream, then work into cheese. Chill before forming into small balls.
Corn a la Creole
Six ears corn, 1 small onion, 2 green peppers, 2 tomatoes, 2 table-pepper.
Cut corn from cob. Mince onion. Remove seeds and white fiber from peppers and mince. Peel and dice tomatoes. Melt butter in a frying pan and add onion. Cook 10 minutes. Add remaining vegetables, cover and cook 20 minutes. Season with salt and pepper and serve on toast with slices of crisp broiled bacon.
If oil is used in place of butter more salt will be needed in seasoning. And if the corn is not freshly picked, 1 teaspoon sugar should be added with corn.

STORM WARNING ISSUED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12 (AP)—The weather bureau today issued the following storm warning: "Advisory 10 a. m. tropical disturbance central near island of Dominica, Lesser Antilles, moving west or west-northwestward at rate of about 450 miles per day attended by winds of hurricane force near center. Its center will pass some distance south of Porto Rico tonight and probably south of Haiti Thursday. Great caution advised vessels in Eastern Caribbean Sea especially north of latitude 15 next 24 hours."

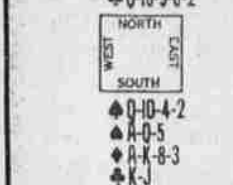
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Bridge Pointers

"Continuing the series of fifty bridge questions, three of which were submitted yesterday in relation to Deal A, Deal B with two questions relating to it follows:

Deal B



QUESTION No. 4. South has bid one no trump. West has passed what should North declare?

QUESTION No. 5. South is playing a No. Trump contract; the first trick is West, Five of Spades; North, Seven of Spades; East, King of Spades; South, Deuce of Spades. To trick 2, East leads the Trey of Spades. What should declarer play from Closed Hand and Dummy on this trick?

QUESTION No. 6. Trick 3 consists of the King of Clubs played by Closed Hand, and small Clubs by Dummy, East and West. What cards should declarer play to trick 4?

Answer: Blank
