Fire Losses In Oregon During August Heavy

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 12.—(AP)—Fire losses over the state of Oregon, outside of Portland, for the month of August totaled \$492,000, which is nearly double that for the corresponding month of 1927, which was \$257,775. The total losses for the state for the eight months period ending August 31, 1928, amounted to \$2,263,000 compared with \$2,139,000 for the same period of last year, an increase of over \$124,000. These figures lead State Fire Marshal, Clarence A. Lee, to declare that there is need of an increased state-wide effort to halt this increasing yearly waste.

The principal losses for August, this year, were: a warehouse and contents at Salem, \$45,000; mill at Seilo, \$40,000; garage and contents at Silverton, \$35,000; bundle factory at New Era, \$30,000; resort house at La Grande, \$21,000.

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 12.—The Twin Falls Daily Times, at Twin Falls, Idaho, has been purchased by a group composed of W. W. Lamph, Lee D. Drake, E. B. Aldrich and J. S. Harvey. The property was bought at receiver's sale on September 1 and the new owners have been publishing the paper since that date. The acquisition of the Twin Falls paper makes three newspapers now in the group of evening dailies owned and operated by the men who own and publish the East Oregonian. The second paper in the group is the Astoria Evening Budget at Astoria, Oregon.

Reginald Denny Here Thursday At Arcade

He passed the examination with honors, but ran away from school at the age of sixteen and began playing "walk on" parts for Charles Frohman's company while touring the British Islands with George Edwards' "Merry Widow."

His school was laid off, Denny, who had trained under Harry Preston, the English sportsman, began to box professionally to earn money. The actor then began working

with successful road shows. He traveled to the United States, including Singapore and many out-of-the-way places. He was frequently entertained by Rajahs, Princes, and other sons of royal native houses.

When the war broke out in 1914, Denny was in New York, but he left immediately to fight for England as a member of the Royal Flying Corps. He later became an amateur boxing champion of the corps.

After the war, Denny signed a contract to play in New York with the Shuberts. However, the Actors Equity strike began about that time and Denny was out of work.

He played his first part in motion pictures during this period for the World Film Company in New York.

He returned to the stage, but again came to pictures, making several films in New York.

Denny next worked in the now famous "Leather Stocking" series, Carl Laemmle, president of Universal Pictures Corporation, liked his work and placed him under contract. Since that time the actor has had a quick rise to the top and he is now the most popular male star on the screen.

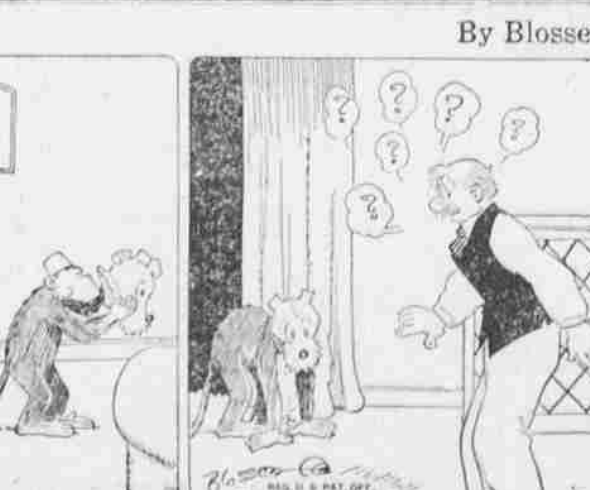
