WOMEN SOB IN TELLING COURT OF DEAD GIRL

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 12 (AP)—Little intimate glimpses of the domestic life of Russell St. Clair Bell and his common law wife, Barbara Mauer, 32-year-old Philadelphia girl with whose death he is charged, were before his murder trial jury on the second day of testimony today.

Women cried as they testified yesterday concerning their visits with the Mauer girl, and of the events which followed her disappearance about June 23.

From the three grief stricken witnesses who took the stand the prosecution was able to obtain testimony which it claims forms an important link in the case against the man who is accused of killing the girl when he found she was to become a mother.

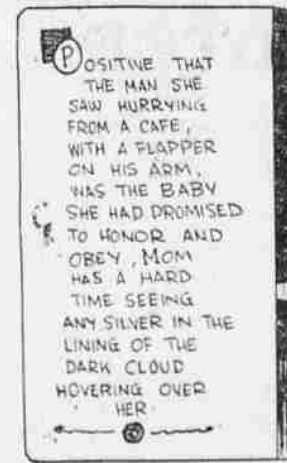

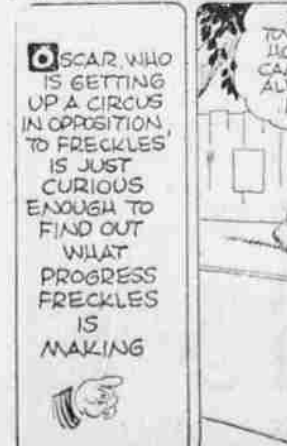
