McKennon Looks For Heavy Yield From Spud Field

Ruth McKennon of Alsea, who is probably the largest grower of spuds in the county is making improvements on his farm to care for the immense crop of potatoes which is coming on. Mr. McKennon is erecting a potato house, which is 40x36 feet in dimensions, with walls 8 feet high. The building is being built entirely on top of the ground but will have double walls and will be built following specifications which guarantee it to be absolutely frost proof. The building, when completed will hold about 25,000 sacks of potatoes.

Mr. McKennon has this year, on his two places about 160 acres of potatoes and has two varieties, the Netted Gem which are almost universally used by the larger potato growers hereabouts and the Burbank. The crops at present are reported to be in very good condition.

Mr. and Mrs. Karl Brown and family who have been living in Imbler since they came to the valley about a year ago, have recently moved into the house on Mr. McKennon's latest acquired farm near the side hill. Mr. Brown is an experienced potato man and has, for himself, the average leased from Mrs. Dave Osborne near Imbler, in potatoes.

Getting Drier Ready

Anticipating the opening of the harvest of prunes, Tom Conklin, of Cove, is getting his drier in readiness to handle his crop. Wood is being hauled and other preliminaries attended to. There are two driers at Cove Mr. Conklin's and John Bean's. The crop this year is described as being one of the best ever, with quantity and quality big but with prices prospect very small.

Has Some Trouble

The North Powder News quite graphically pictures a fall in which Harry McMillan of the Wolf creek neighborhood figured prominently.

HOME MARKET SURVEY IS PROGRESSING OVER THE GRANDE RONDE

Although not much has been said the last few weeks in regard to the project, the work of Robert Haley, expert from Corvallis, who has been here for a few months putting on the home market survey in Union county, goes on apace and while progress is more or less slow until certain data is in, nevertheless the survey is moving.

Mr. Haley has spent the greater part of his time of late getting in reports from grocers and all other merchants in the county who handle any kind of food products. In gathering in these facts Mr. Haley has met with splendid cooperation from Union county's store-keepers. Of the long list

Following the completion of this part of the survey there will follow two others, the first being a survey of all products raised within the confines of the county and the other of all products shipped in. When all this data has been ascertained then it will be possible for the experts to ascertain the desired information, namely, how far producers can meet the demands of the county's markets, and how far the merchants can exhaust the produce raised here.

It will be remembered that the survey is being put on under the direction of the Union county chamber of commerce, with Frank McKennon of Imbler as chairman of the committee in charge. The survey is quite exhaustive and gigantic in its proportions but is made by experts to be absolutely practical and very much worth-while.

A SEASONABLE RECIPE

Corn Relish
1 dozen ears sweet corn,
1 quart onions,
2 sweet green peppers,
2 cups vinegar,
2 large or 1 dozen small red peppers.

1 quart ripe cucumbers,
1 quart ripe tomatoes,
5 cups vinegar,
4 cups sugar,
1/2 cup salt (scant),
2 teaspoons turmeric,
1 tablespoon celery seed,
5 cents worth white mustard seed.

Put all through chopper or chop in mixing bowl if preferred. Add other ingredients and boil 15 or 20 minutes. Can while hot.
