MENUS

BREAKFAST — Green grape jam, cereal, bread, buttered, liver-wurst, celery and radishes, nutmeg milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Potato and parsley soup, braised beef and buttered sandwiches, stuffed tomato salad, sugar cream jumbles, grape juice.

DINNER — Baked cottage loaf, eggplant potatoes, buttered lima beans, apple salad, fresh peach cobbler, milk, coffee.

Cream shortening and gradual.

by heat to sugar. Work in 1-2 cup flour and add one well beaten. Add another half cup of flour and stir until smooth. Add some cream and mix thoroughly. Add soda dissolved in cold water and beat mixture hard for one minute. Add remaining flour, salt, coconut and vanilla. Mix thoroughly. Chill for several hours. Roll on a slightly floured molding board into a sheet about 1-4 inch thick. Cut with a doughnut cutter and bake in a moderately hot oven for eight to ten minutes.

Work scraps of dough left from cutting into a sheet and cut in squares.

WIDER FUR COLLARS. PATRICIA (AP).—Deep fur cuffs require wide fur collars and new winter coats have both. Some of the long haired furs are used for upstanding collars which almost take the head, most from the back. Evening coats in particular have the wide collars, sometimes in shawl and sometimes straight effects.

Furly lamb and natural colored sealskin are the furs most used for the day coats with deep shaped cuffs and fur bands for trimming. The flat furs are sometimes used in elaborate scarf collars with original fastenings. A clouded crystal ring, or an amber or jade ornament through which the scarf and pulls, is a new coat clasp.

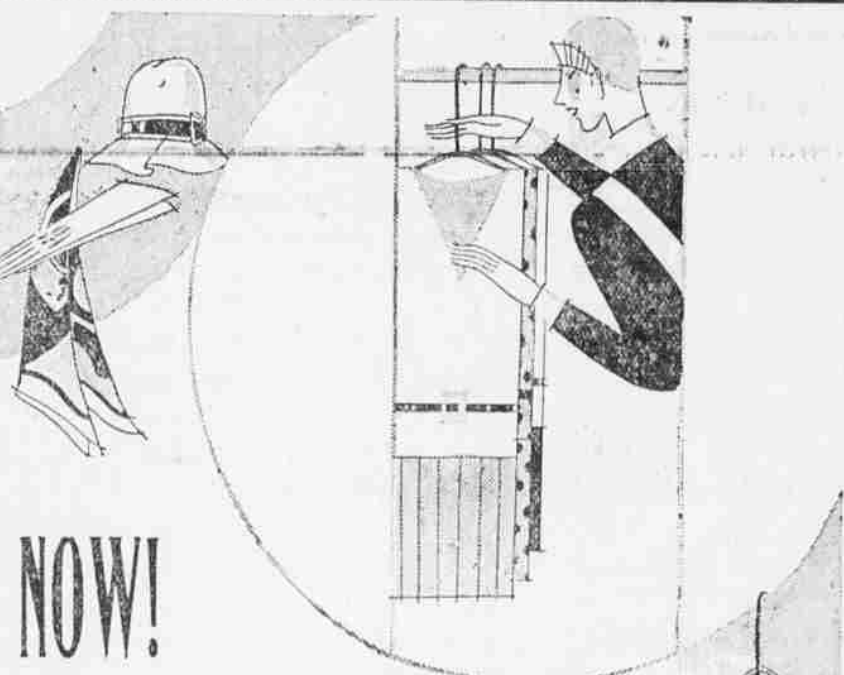

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE

We give today another Contract hand in which all the bidding is carried on by North and South. East and West passing whenever it is their turn to declare. The question is how North and South should bid their hands. Make up your mind before you read the explanation that follows. South is the Dealer, and the hands are:

♠A-7-2	♠K-5-3
♥K-6-4-2	♥A-7-3
♦Q-10-5	♦K-10-4
♣K-8-3	♣Q-10-9

The Bidding. South should bid one No Trump on the basis of the Ace-King-Jack-Queen 2 and Jack 1 point. South's hand totals 14. This, with three suits stopped, justifies a No Trump, and South in this case has strength in four suits.

After South's one No Trump, and West's pass, North should bid two No Trump. North's hand, on the basis of the above count, totals 8. The minimum concept with a two-Ace bidding requires 8, that justifies jumping partner's one No Trump to two.

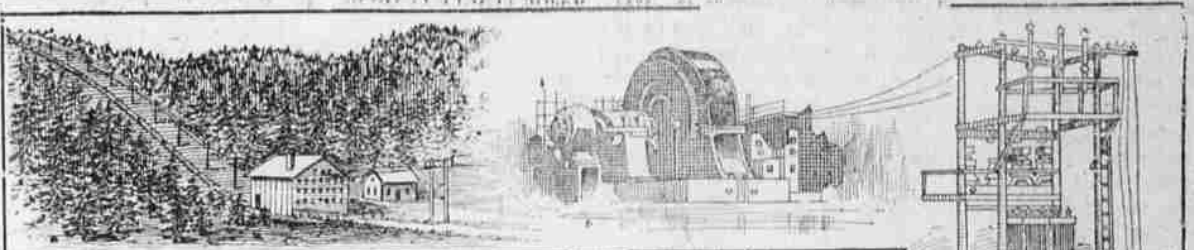
After North's two No Trump, and East's pass, South should pass. South has not the strength to jump. Only one bid is left, cannot be made. After an initial bid of one No Trump and a jump of one for the partner, the initial bidder should jump to three when his hand counts 15 or more. One No Trump bids which are made with a count of 12, 13, or 14 should not be made in the initial Denial.

The chances are that three cannot be made with counts under 15. A bid like partner is not strong enough to jump to more than two.

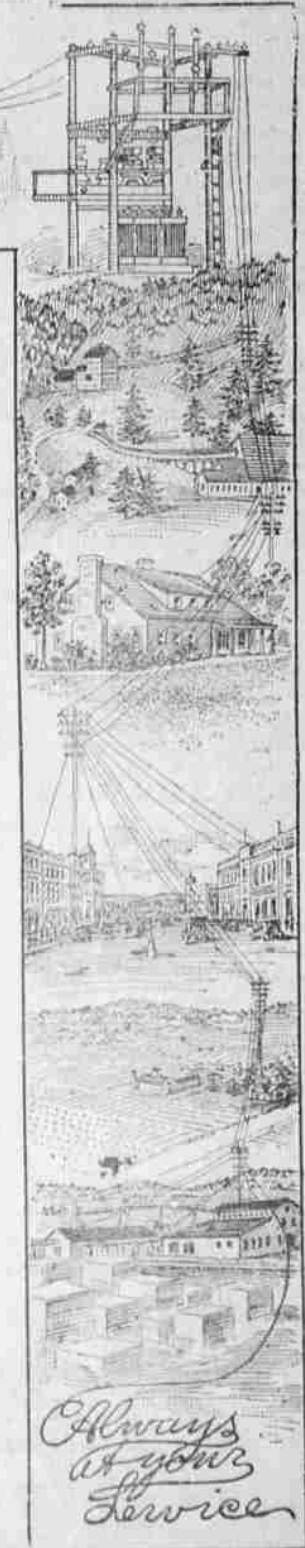
