2 Civilizations Existed in Old Days of America

NEW YORK, Sept. 17 (AP)—Two prehistoric civilizations existed in the western hemisphere and were not directly connected with each other, the International Congress of Americanists was told today.

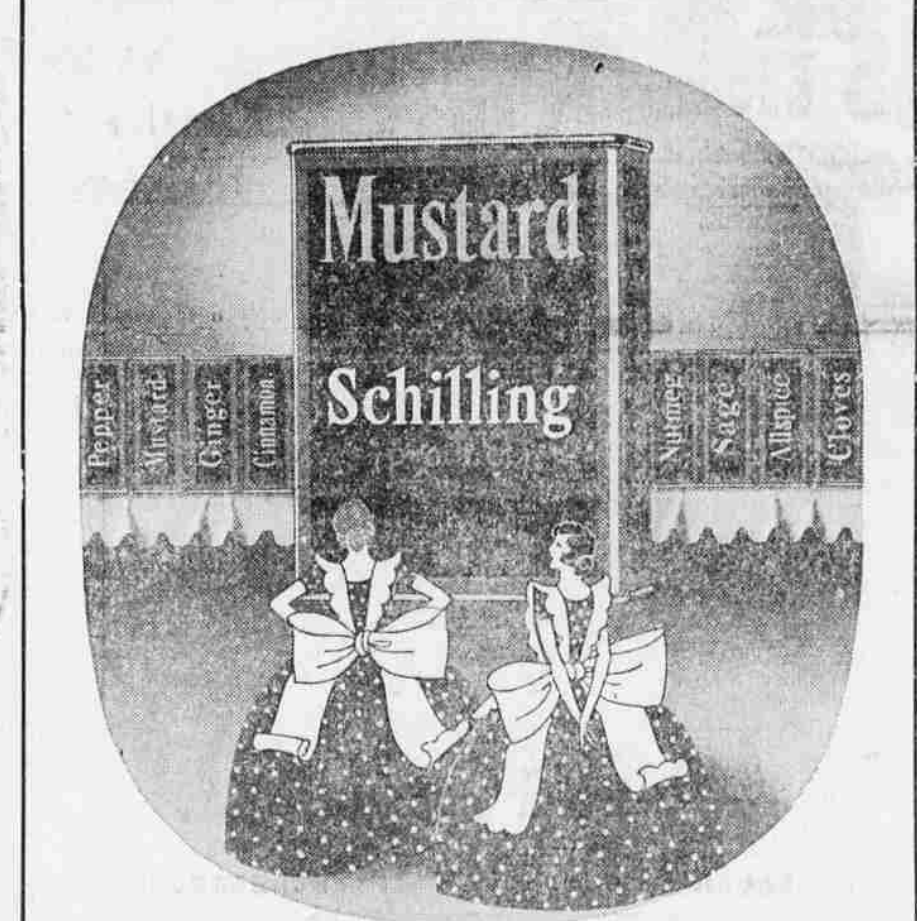
The congress is meeting here for a week, attended by delegates from a score of foreign nations, to discuss the origin of American inhabitants, and compare notes on evidences that they migrated from the old world thousands of years ago.

The cultural relations of North and South America were traced through archaeological remains by Prof. A. L. Kroeber of the University of California. The two civilizations he said were in "Mexico-Guatemala" and in Peru. In the intervening regions he found evidence of a civilization common to both areas.

MENUS

By Sister Mary.
BREAKFAST—Apples, cereal cooked with dates, cream, eggs in nests, extra toast, milk, coffee.
LUNcheon—Casseroles of carrots and potatoes, cold boiled tongue, rye bread, baked peaches, milk, tea.

DINNER—Corned beef, potatoes in parsley butter, creamed kohlrabi, sliced tomatoes, with succotash, baked leek, buckwheat pudding, milk, coffee.

A good cut of corned beef is good in more ways than one. Sliced and melted with a tart dressing, pressed with vegetables or hot corned beef, it lends itself to appetizing meals.

Casseroles of Carrots and Potatoes—Two cups diced raw potatoes, 2 cups diced raw carrots, 1 onion, 4 tablespoons butter or bacon fat, 1/2 teaspoon salt, boiling water.

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in baking dish. Add onion peeled and cut in thin slices. Put into a hot oven for a few minutes. Add potatoes, carrots and salt and stir well. Add enough boiling water to come up to the top of the vegetables. Cover and cook in a moderate oven about one hour. Uncover and remove butter and brown on top. Serve from baking dish. The water should be cooked away and the vegetables tender.
