"ROMA" READY FOR LONG HOP TO ROME, ITALY

OLD ORCHARD, Me., Sept. 17 (AP)—The crew of the Italian monoplane Roma hoped to be winging their way to Rome sometime before tonight.

Word late yesterday from Pietro Bonelli, radio operator, and navigator of the expedition, that audience weather was at hand and that he was speeding here from New York City where he had been in consultation with government weather experts, spurred his three companions to immediate activity.

The big plane, in which the four will endeavor to negotiate the 4,500 mile trip, was taken from Southern Field near Portland for a test flight during which it made a landing here. At the conclusion of the flight the machine was pronounced in readiness.

Fourteen hundred gallons of fuel must be poured into the tanks but that was practically all that remained to be done.
