Giants Cling to St. Louis in National League By Lacing Pirates

With their closest rivals hanging on like grim death their dreams of the American flag, the national league champions of Bill McKeon and Miller Huggins, Bill has his St. Louis Cardinals at the top of the National League standing and Miller, who keeps his eyes on the level or slanted upward, can see nothing to rival his New York Yankees in the American league, but their advantage is so small as to make untroubled sleep a thing impossible.

It looks now as though neither is to get any peace of mind until Sept. 19 when the big league season closes.

Two other American league engagements, the Washington Senators vs. Detroit, 4 to 2, and the Boston Red Sox vs. Chicago White Sox, 6 to 3, were played on Sunday.

But the National League situation remained unchanged when the Cardinals, New York Giants and Chicago Cubs turned in victories.

The Giants remained only two games distant from St. Louis by losing the Pittsburgh Pirates, 9 to 7, in the second game of the series. Pirates and Home Run Blankenship were easy meat for the batting Giants who pounded out 14 hits, including home runs by Welsh and O'Rourke. The Pirates' two runs off Karl Hubbell were scored in the sixth when Pie Traynor hit for the circuit with Paul Waner on base.

The Cubs trounced Boston, 5 to 1, to retain their third place position, a game and a half behind the Giants.

Walker to Meet Loughran, Light Heavy Champion



LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18 (AP)—The Flamingo says today that Mickey Walker, middleweight champion has been matched for a title bout with Tommy Loughran, light heavyweight champion, at Madison Square Garden some time in November.

The announcement came through Jack Kearns, Walker's manager as the fighter and his manager boarded a train for Chicago. Kearns is reported to have said that while his difficulties with Richard are not over, the New York promoter, nevertheless, will handle the bout.

Loughran, Kearns said, will probably get \$75,000 as his share of the match. As for Walker, Kearns said he was not nearly as much interested in the money as a "shot at the title." A definite date for the bout will probably be determined upon Kearns' arrival in New York.
