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Butcher Boy To Die On Gallows On November 23

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 15 (AP)—Len "Pat" Kelley, convicted of the murder of Mrs. Myrtle L. Melus, his society woman sweetheart, today was sentenced to be hanged at San Quentin penitentiary Nov. 23, next.

Calmly, with a look apparently of complete resignation, the "butcher boy" listened to the pronouncement that he die on the gallows for the slaying which rocked fashionable Wilshire last August 5.

Passing of sentence followed demand by Superior Judge Fletcher Drown of a motion of Kelley's counsel for a new trial. The attorney for the five-year lawyer of the wealthy club woman cited a long list of statutory grounds, basing his argument principally on the statement that the evidence did not support a first degree murder verdict.

billed for a stop of 15 minutes. Senators and assemblymen with leaders from all parts of the state were listed among those who accepted Senator Edge's invitation for the luncheon in the city. In calling the gathering before it was known that the candidate would be here on the same day Senator Edge announced that he hoped by the meeting to keep alive the enthusiasm for Mr. Hoover, which was kindled at the convention at Kansas City at which he was nominated.

The republican nominee's first day of eastern campaigning came to a close in this city last night. After a half-day through cheering crowds—Moultrie, Blountville, Vernon, Caldwell—where Grover Cleveland was born—the candidate rode at the head of a great Jerry procession to the army of the 113th regiment where he received a warm acclaim.

Favors Ideal of Labor.

There the republican nominee declared himself in favor of the ideal of labor, of a full-time job for every man willing to work. He criticized the democratic stand on the tariff and immigration questions as possible hindrances to the attainment of this ideal, and told of the various steps taken by the republican party in the last seven and a half years in that direction.

The candidate appealed to an audience in which there were many representatives of the so-called working classes not to take a stand which might throw their support to a change of policy when he said the nation's industries were steadily advancing toward labor's dream of constant employment for the working man.

Senator Edge and Representative Franklin Fort, of East Orange, who is secretary of the republican national committee, said they were moved at the reception which Mr. Hoover received in the suburbs, especially in view of the fact that he invited these meetings at a time when men were at their desks in New York or otherwise engaged in the day's occupations.
