

AGGIES PREPARE FOR FIRST GAME

Cecil Sherwood Worked at Left Half, Only New-comer on Varsity

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Sept. 18 (AP)—The pounds have dropped off as the Oregon Aggie football team has gone through their opening training sessions. Yet in spite of the warm sunshine and tempered still the team in weight has not been so large as is usual for opening training. The greatest individual loss was not greater than six or eight pounds and some of the big boys only revealed away a couple of pounds, indicating that training at the end of spring practice to keep fit has been well needed.

More than 25 candidates, or better than four full teams of varsity players, are running through plays daily. There will remain several prospects, mostly from the 1927 squad, in camp as every one of the 18 lettersmen returned. Even the Fred Schell who was reported to be football about being able to play on account of an infection, has returned to bolster the back field. Schell, with regular training, will be able to uphold his side of the line.
