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Bridge Pointers

Continuing the series of fifty Bridge questions, two of which were submitted yesterday in relation to Deal D. Deal E with two questions relating to it follows:

Deal E.

♠ K-Q-5
♥ J-10-9-7
♦ 5
♣ A-K-8-6-2

NORTH
SOUTH

♠ 7-2
♥ A-K-6-5-3
♦ A-Q-6
♣ 7-5-3

QUESTION No. 10. With East and West passing whenever it is their turn to decline, what bid should North and South make with the above hand?

With South the Declarer, and North the trump, the cards played to the first trick were: West, Jack of Diamonds; Dummy, Five of Diamonds; East, Four of Diamonds; South, Queen of Diamonds. To the second trick South leads the Ace of Hearts and both adversaries follow with small Hearts.

QUESTION No. 11. What should East lead to trick 2?

Answers.

10. South should bid one Heart and North should pass. South becoming the Declarer with the contract one Heart. South's Heart bid is obvious and North has ample strength to jump Hearts to at least four, but he is so strong that there is no necessity for a jump. There is little chance that the adversaries will be able to bid high enough to become troublesome, or that a lead-indicating bid by East will be of advantage to them; on the other hand, they may bid to heights which will permit a profitable double, or they may be induced to double a high Heart contract which North and South can make.

11. South should lead a Spade; he has but one chance of capturing a Small Spade, etc., that he can drop the adverse Queen of Hearts on the next trump round, and that West has the Ace of Spades. If so, he will be able to discard a losing Club on a high Spade in Dummy. It may be, however, if South lead a Spade, that West, with the Ace, will not play it on the first round, and in that event South must repeat the Spade lead. So he keeps the King of trumps as an entry and does not lead it to trick 2.
