Railroad Dispute Settlement Now Up To Coolidge
CHICAGO, Sept. 18 (AP)—Representatives of 25 western railroads and 75,000 trainmen and conductors now look to President Coolidge to expedite a settlement of wage differences between them. The Federal Board of Mediation, which has been attempting to reconcile opposing demands of the unions and railway officials for the past week, announced yesterday that no adjustment of wages and the working rule had been reached. No definite official action can be taken for two months, officials explained, although the trainmen and conductors have voted in favor of a strike. If President Coolidge should intervene and appoint a fact finding commission, under the Railway Labor act, the special board would have 30 days to investigate and report. If such a report were made, the unions would be compelled to wait an equal 30 days before acting. If the president should decide to refrain from taking a hand, the unions might act at once.

he answered a series of eight questions propounded to him in a full page advertisement in the morning newspaper by ten New Yorkers who styled themselves "citizens of both parties." In his replies, he declared in substance that the president can do nothing about liquor, except to make recommendations to congress and assume a leadership on the question, and further that he would not attempt to persuade any democratic member of congress to go against his constituents. If they wanted prohibition, he said, they should go to congress.

ABOUT 2,000 ARE LOST IN STORM AREA

five bodies were in a poolroom when they reached the stricken town and that they recovered 12 more within a radius of 300 yards. Sheriff Bob Baker, of Palm Beach county, and a squad of deputies who went to Panama, Canal zone and South Bay to bring in bodies of the storm victims, said today the outboard motor boats in which they went were "wholly inadequate." The sheriff said a sea shift would be taken into the area today, stationed at a strategic point as a base of operations and that motor boats would bring the dead to the shore. He said most of the dead were negroes.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., Sept. 18 (AP)—Howard Kelly, chairman of the Palm Beach county Red Cross, told a conference of relief workers today that bodies of 200 persons, victims of the hurricane, had been buried in local cemeteries.

The bodies came from the region about Lake Oklawaha, he said. Half of them were of white people.

"Conditions in the stricken area are growing worse every minute," Kelly said. "About 5,000 persons in the lake region are in desperate need of clothing, food and medical aid."

"They have been standing in water for hours and hours and there are a number of cases of double pneumonia. There are about 1,500 homeless in the county," Palm Beach county commissioners said of the vast coast area and Oklawaha lake, sections affected by the storm.

The estimated damage of Palm Beach county placed yesterday at \$25,000,000 now is nearer \$30,000,000.

"Sanitary conditions in the lake regions are terrible although conditions along the coast are fairly good. In the lake region two companies of state national guard troops arrived last night and are on duty. The sections around Oklawaha and canal point are under military control."

"Clothing, especially shoes, are badly needed."

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 18 (AP)—Portions of the hotel section were flooded, trees were uprooted, signs and wires torn from their fastenings and windows smashed by the tail end of the West Indian hurricane which has been lashing this city during the past 18 hours.

The wind, which attained a maximum velocity of 52 miles an hour this morning, had dropped to 40 miles an hour at noon.

BODIES FOUND; POLICE SEEK OIL PROMOTER
LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18 (AP)—Mystery today cast still another shadow over the strange disappearance of Mrs. and Mrs. Albert La Huis, wealthy Michigan residents, even though sheriff's deputies this morning reported the finding of bodies believed to be those of the missing couple beneath a wrecked car in the mountainous country near San Diego, Calif.

For the discovery of the two bodies only raised the question, "Where is P. J. Walker?"

Walker was the La Huis, Calif. oil promoter who accompanied the couple on their trip to Bakersfield, Calif., to inspect some oil properties. No trace of him was found near the car.

Positive identification of the bodies was lacking yet. The strongest indication that the bodies were those of the Zeeland, Mich., couple who came to California in August from Miami, Fla., to look over some oil lands in which La Huis was reported to have invested \$75,000 "sight unseen" was the wreckage of the car. Its license revealed it was registered to Evelyn D. Walker, wife of the oil man.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 18 (AP)—Following a raid by federal agents directed by Terry Talbot, Mrs. A. J. Roschinski, 27, was arrested today charged with operating a beer garden. Officers reported finding 14 persons drinking. The visitors were allowed to go. Four hundred quarts of beer, pretzels, sandwiches and other essentials of a beer garden, were reported found on the place.

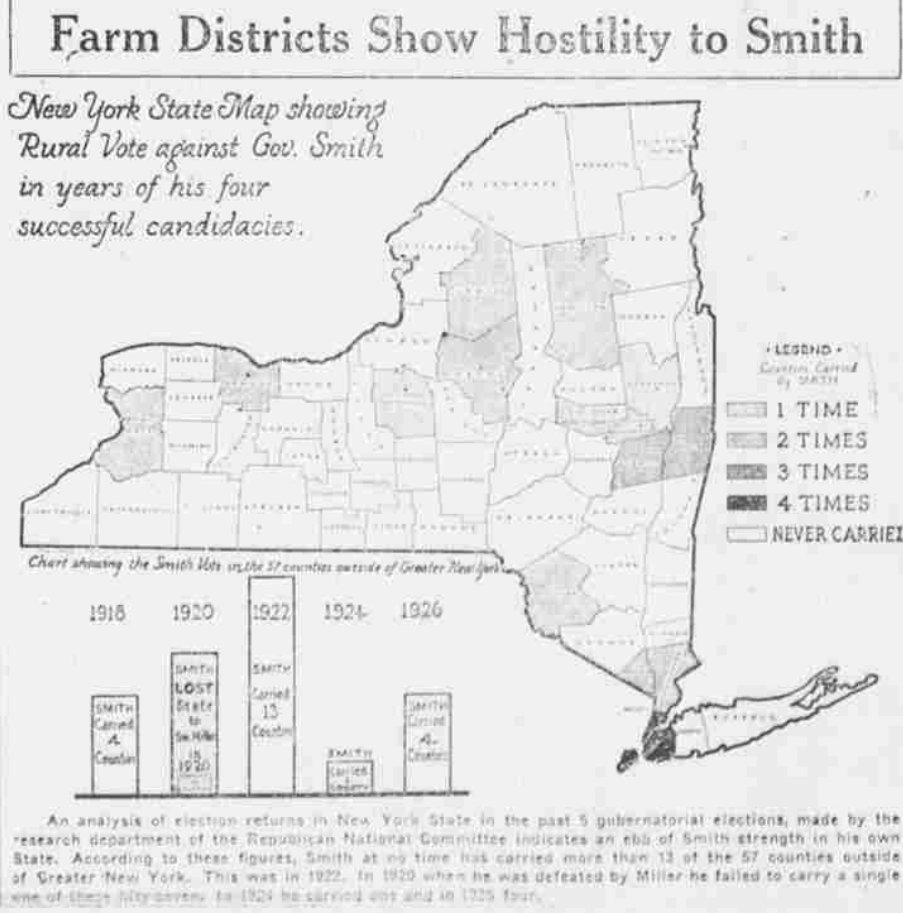
