

OIL BURNING AIR MOTOR SUCCESS

Engine, Weighing Three Pounds Per Horsepower, Invented and Tested

DETROIT, Sept. 19 (AP)—The Packard Motor company has announced the successful testing of an oil burning airplane motor, the first of its kind ever developed. The demonstration was made last Wednesday before a group of mechanical engineers in a regulation Wilson-Detroit municipal building.

The engine, which weighs only three pounds per horsepower, is a radical air-cooled type and develops the horsepower of an oil engine of the same size. It is a simple and rugged design, the engine has fewer parts than the lightest gasoline engine now in use.

The three radical improvements over the gasoline motor, claimed by its designers, are: Elimination of the danger of fire from gasoline. Reduction of fuel consumption and cost. It is claimed the motor will carry a plane 24 per cent further with the same weight in oil fuel as compared with gasoline.

Making possible of radio communication with aircraft on a broad scale due to elimination of interference by electrical ignition systems and gasoline engines. Weight of Engine Less. From the engineering standpoint, the most brilliant achievement is claimed in the weight reduction of such a Diesel engine. Until now the lightest Diesel plant ever built weighed 100 pounds per horsepower. The new plant weighs less than three pounds per horsepower.
