NEW YORK, Sept. 20 (AP)—The supply ship U. S. S. Bridge called today from the Brooklyn army base for San Juan with food and supplies for relief of the Puerto Rican hurricane victims. The ship took aboard tents and blankets, 1,000,000 pounds of food.

60 Buried in One Grave

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Sept. 20 (AP)—The St. Petersburg Times today published a dispatch from a staff correspondent at West Palm Beach which said sixty bodies were buried yesterday in one huge grave, dug by a steam shovel. He said bodies were brought in so rapidly from the lake region that a crew of carpenters was kept busy building rough coffins.

Distribute Food

SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, Sept. 20 (AP)—Food supplies were moving into the hurricane-stricken districts outside of San Juan today under Red Cross supervision. Tents and blankets were being distributed to the army for emergency hospitals and for the shelter of those who were forced to bivouac.

Storm in Mexico

MEXICO CITY, Sept. 20 (AP)—A property loss of \$5,000,000 from river floods and extensive damage to crops and buildings are described in newspaper dispatches from Tampico as the result of a heavy storm which has been raging in the region between San Germen and Tampico for several days. Precipitation comparable to the considerable damage.

"In this envelope," he said, "there is \$5,100 in \$100 bills and a bank deposit book which shows that Captain Knott has made many substantial deposits. We have just obtained the envelope from a young woman. She received it from another young woman to whom Captain Knott had given it this morning. Obviously we cannot reveal the names of the women, but we submit the envelope and its contents in evidence."

Officers Suspended

After the hearing C. J. Britton, assistant superintendent of police, demanded the trio's badges and keys, informing them that they were suspended.

Mexican Pyramid 60 Centuries Old

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Wired reports from Mexico, which have indicated 1,000 years on a pyramid that may have been built before 5,000 B. C., have been found by archeologists in Mexico.

The discoveries were being kept secret, says Russell Phipps, director of the Minneapolis Institute of Art, who learned of them while on a trip to Mexico and Yucatan.

At Tlalapa, 16 miles southwest of Mexico City, Phipps declares he saw "a marvelous stone pyramid standing in the center of a field of 1,000 years ago."

"Surrounding the pyramid on three sides is a series of stone carvings. The heads are well carved, while the bodies are made of stones set together to give a chunky effect. They are like the serpents found on Mayan and Aztec ruins and the ruins in Cambodia, across the border in Indo-China."

"An unusual feature is that so much color is preserved," he says.

Cafe Gun Battle Kills One, Hurts 2

CHICAGO, Sept. 20 (AP)—A gun fight in the Turkish cafe on North Clark street early today ended with John Pecora, a patron, dead, and two policemen, Alton Carroll and John Fogarty, wounded.

Pecora, his wife, a man whose name was not learned and Miss Rosa Landi, composed the party, which police were called to quiet. The cafe management summoned police after efforts of waiters to quiet the men had failed.

When officers Carroll and Fogarty approached, Pecora and his companion drew pistols and opened fire, witnesses said. The officers, wounded, returned the fire, dropping Pecora mortally wounded. Pecora's companion fled.

The two women were held for questioning.

NORTHCOTT AND MOTHER HELD BY CANADIAN POLICE

named here months before, had admitted that he was not the abducted youth and that his assumption of young Collins' name was a hoax. This confirmed the suspicions of the mother of Walter Collins, who had insisted that the boy returned to her was not her son. Walter Collins was named by young Sanford Clark as one of the four boys tortured and murdered on the Northcott farm.

The boy, who had been brought here from Illinois said he not only was not Walter Collins but that he never had been in California before.

Blood which stained cloths of earth in two supposed graves on the Northcott farm yesterday was declared by City Chemist, Rex Welch to be of human origin. A previous test by the chemist had indicated that the blood was not that of a human being but discovered that serum used in the previous test was faulty, he repeated the test with the result he announced yesterday.

Previously two pathologists had identified bones found buried on the suspected "murder farm" as those of human beings. The murder charge against Northcott and his mother is based on the death of an unidentified Mexican boy whose body was found near Pointe, Cal.
