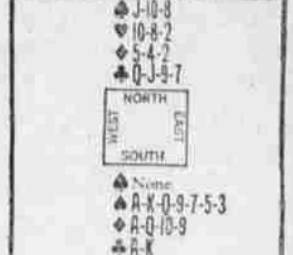

Bridge Pointers

CONTRACT BRIDGE
Continuing our series of Contract Bridge in which one side only participates in the bidding, the other side passing whenever it is its turn to declare, we give another pair of South and South hands today, in which South is the Dealer.



Make up your mind how this hand should be bid by South and North before reading the explanation that follows.

The Bidding
South should open the contracting by bidding either five or six hearts. The hand is practically sure to take eleven tricks unassisted; only a wildly freakish distribution of the adverse cards could prevent its doing so.

As there is little chance that South will jump, it is important that South bid the full strength of his hand. The two elements of risk in bidding six are: (a) North may have the Ace of Spades and jump to seven on the strength of it, although that Ace would not add a trick to South's holding; (b) the Small Slam probably de-

pends upon finding the King or Jack of Diamonds with North, and both may be missing although the chances are that one of them is there. Of course it would be a sad outcome if, with a sure 5-odd and game in sight, North and South should bid for a Slam and fail to make it. However, the six-odd is a gamble which probably will succeed.

When this hand was played, six was bid; a Spade was led; South trumped and led the Ace of Clubs, expecting to exhaust the adverse trumps in two rounds. But all three adverse trumps were in one hand, and after the first trump round South was obliged to retreat to the trying expedient of leading the Ace and King of Clubs to strike 3 and 4, and then a small trump, playing the Eight, from dummy. The adversaries took this trump, led another Spade which South ruffed; put Dummy in with the Ten of trumps; cashed the two good Clubs, discarding two Diamonds from Closed Hand, and then tried the Diamond finesse which succeeded and gave Declarer the Small Slam. The gambit of unnecessarily losing a trump (so as to set up an entry in dummy) was the only way in which the Slam could be made.

MENUS

BREAKFAST—Peaches, cereal, cream, baked French toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Ham and veal timbales, creamed carrots, stuffed celery cutlets, apple sauce, fruit, milk, tea.

DINNER—Vegetable soup, trout, chicken, salad, fruit, vanilla custard.

This is the third time of year to serve "acceptable" dinners. Almost any combination can be chosen and the result will only fail to bring the necessity of varying the method of cooking.

The ham and veal timbales are planned to use up any left-overs from the last previous dinner—the veal stew and baked ham, ham.

Ham and Veal Timbales
One cup chopped ham and liver mixed, 2 1/2 cups bread crumbs, 2 1/2 cups milk, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 2 eggs, salt and pepper.

Melt butter and bread crumbs and milk and cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Add meat, liver and eggs, mix thoroughly. Season with salt and pepper. The quantity of mixture depending on the thickness of the meat. Turn into buttered individual molds or one large one, baking 20 minutes. Turn out on a hot plate, cover with hot water, let stand 20 minutes in a hot oven. Turn out of molds onto a hot plate for and serve.
