DENVER WELCOMES GOVERNOR SMITH

Democratic Nominee Will Deliver Third Western Speech This Evening

DENVER, Sept. 22 (AP)—Governor Smith arrived in Denver today and was given an ovation as he stepped from his special train. Tonight in the city's auditorium he will deliver the third speech of his western campaign tour with water-power as the theme.

A large committee of democratic leaders from over the state welcomed the democratic presidential nominee. As he proceeded to a line of automobiles waiting to take his party on parade to the hotel, a 15-gun governor's salute was fired.

One of the largest crowds since he left Albany turned out to see Gov. Smith stand in his automobile waving his brown derby as photographers and movie men took pictures at the union station.

mother and her grandson and son to a farmhouse where three of Northcott's victims were alleged to have died and been buried, Clark said, and where young Clark was sleeping. Gordon struck the first blow, then "one of the two boys" struck Mrs. Northcott, Clark said, forcing her grandson to take the axe and crash it against Clark's head. Mrs. Northcott struck the fatal blow herself, Clark said.

"I'm old and it wouldn't be hard to die," she argued, Clark said, and from that time on she remained at the side of the three other boys supposed to have been killed by Northcott and his mother. The axe that killed the youths was rained in a bucket of water in the ranch yard, Clark said, and officers upon investigation reported they had found the bucket under a pile of hay. Clark also said Northcott removed three of the bodies buried on the farm after he had run away, leaving that Clark might tell what he knew.

What police thought were empty graves were also found on the ranch.

Will Bring Back Two
Both Clark and the elder Northcott are being held by Riverside authorities. Today, county officers prepared to leave on Sunday for Vancouver, B. C., Canada, where Gordon Stuart Northcott is held following his capture at Vancouver, B. C., after an intensive search. They will return the youths here to face the murder charges and will also go to Calgary, Alberta, Canada, where the mother is held after her capture there.

Another Buila county fire near Paradise burned over 1,000 acres, while a third near Clapperville had burned over 15,000 acres in two days.

A dozen fires near Redding, in Shasta county, rained ash down on the village.

SIX BUILDINGS BURNED
—Fire which destroyed six buildings and menaced the entire camp at the new Bear creek dam of the Portland water works system, was being fought today by 25th men. Early today the fire had been kept out of the main camp, which contains 45 buildings.

Women and children, who were taken to places of safety late yesterday when the fire was at its worst, had returned to their homes this morning.

The fire which started in washings in the canyon which is the scene of the 12,000-acre project, spread rapidly, and all available men were ordered out to fight it while work on the dam was suspended and women and children fled. When the wind died down last night the main part of camp was out of danger.

Near Bendy fire late yesterday swept through the washings of the Bear Creek Logging company, destroyed all the camp buildings, several railroad ties and donkey engines. A large force of men supervised by forest rangers from Zig Zag fought the flames throughout most of the night. It was believed this morning that further spread of the fire had been prevented, unless another high wind should arise.
